Plan Haggis Salute 6th Burns' Supper

What though on hamely fare we dine —
Wear hoddin grey, an' a' that!
The coward slave — we pass him by —
We dare be poor for a' that,
For a' that, an' a' that,

The rank is but the guinea's stamp;

From a poem by Robert Burns, who was born at Alloway, near Ayr, in Bonnie Scotland, January 25th, 1759.
It has been said, "Burns is neither eighteenth century nor nineteenth century, neither local nor temporary, but the very flame of a man, speaking as a man has only spoken once or twice in the world."
Be as it may, for the last 171 years, Scotsmen throughout the world pay tribute to this man's memory, once a year, on the anniversary of his birthday.
At the Legion this year, it will be no exception for on Friday, Jan. 27th, there will be the sixth annual Burns' Supper. Night where Scot and Sassenach alike will salute this great poet who once referred to the

haggis as "great chieftain of the pudding race!"
Six years ago, when this function was first held, no one dreamed that it would become as popular as it is right now. From a mere handful of people attending the first 'Burns' Supper' it has developed in popularity to such a degree that now the number of tickets sold have to be limited.
