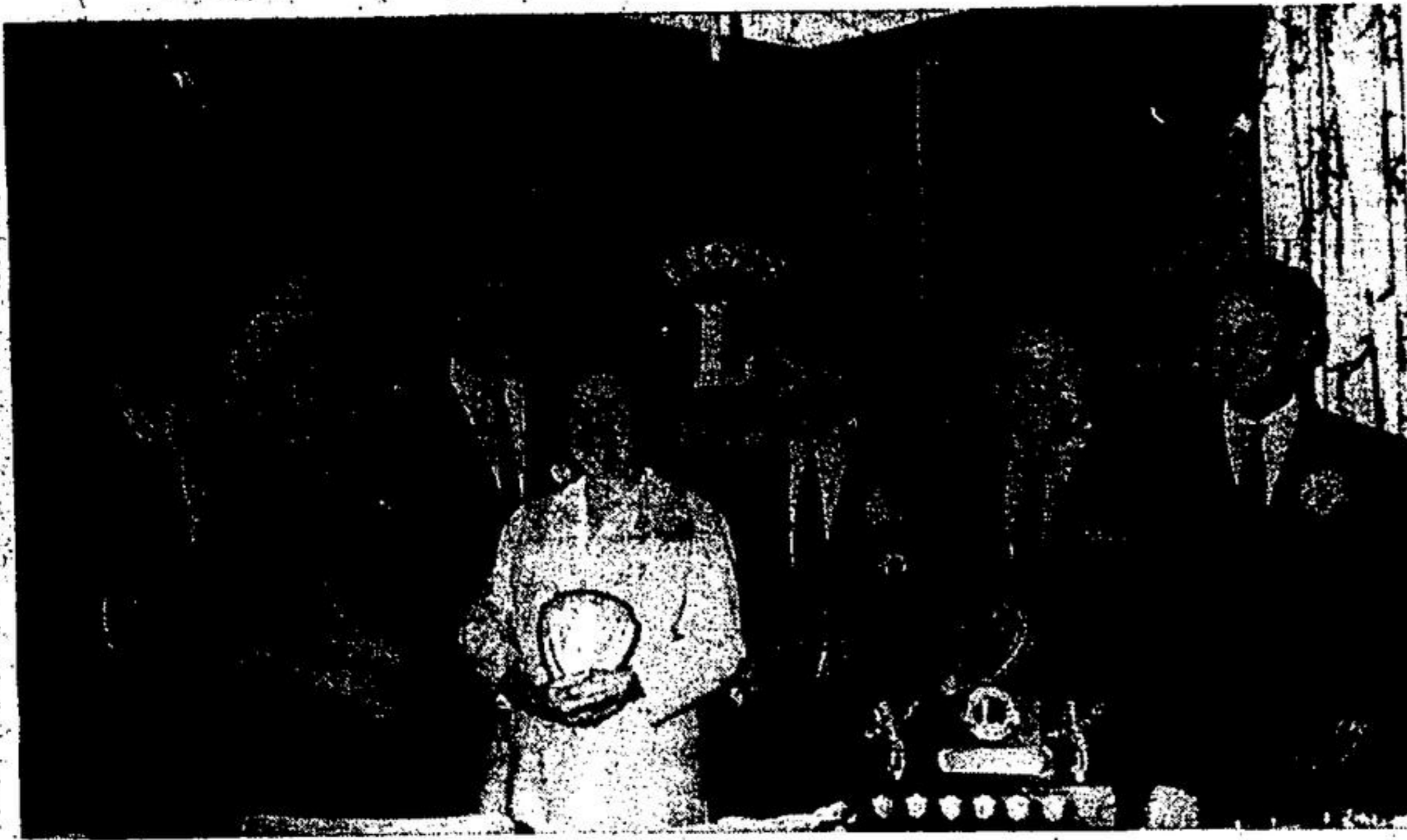


Parade's Best are Lion Guests at Award Presentation Dinner
