Since the Collingwood days, Bush has done some traveling in the hockey world. A half dozen years with the OHA Junior A Guelph Biltmore end in a move to Hamilton.

After a number of seasons with Red Wings, he moved to the professional hockey circuit for coaching stints with the Pittsburgh Hornets, and Memphis Wings.

This season, Bush came back to Junior A hockey, and he says he has no plans to leave again. Although he says the pros were easier to coach, he simply hasn't found the satisfaction anywhere else he derives from handling the Juniors.

Asked if a coaching spot with one of the National Hockey League expansion teams might not be an enticing position, Bush maintained that he would probably stick with the Hamilton organization.

Despite his achievements as a coach, Eddie Bush still loved playing best. "I would have given all my successful years as a coach for a chance to play until I was 50," he said. "I loved to get out on the ice and give them stick, and be booted out of the rink — then turn around and give them the stick again."

And you don't have to listen too closely to hear the chuckle in his voice when he says that.

Halton Region Conservation Authority is in the process of buying the assets of the now defunct Glen Eden Ski Club after it had one offer turned down at Christmas.

The Authority is presently operating the ski area at Kelso Park and in the short time since Christmas Eve has raked in around \$3,500 already.

"Skiing conditions are excellent here," Field Officer Dave Murray commented after the weekend.

"We have around 250 people here today and on Sunday there were between 350 and 400 up here.

"I think it was a good move to take over the ski business."

The figure asked for the assets of the club by the trustee in bankruptcy, is around \$9,340.

Before the Glen Eden Club went broke last year the Conservation Authority spent \$28,000 on a new tow line at Kelso, located northwest of Rattlesnake Point.

The club had liabilities of \$15,000.

Then the Authority decided, after considerable argument and discussion, to take over the ski business.

Ski Management appointed Ken Potter as manager of the area and since official, "On good weekends that time hundreds of skiers
