Armbro Flight is raced by ABC Farms on No. 7 Hwy. six miles east of Georgetown.

Brother Edwin and Elgin Armstrong and Elgin's son Charles, owners of Armbro Flight will receive the International Championship Trophy during IHTA's annual meeting Jan. 31.

Armbro Flight missed the last half of the season with injuries, but still scored nine victories in 13 starts and earned \$153,950 in 1966. She has won 50 events in her three season career and has finished out of the money only twice in 64 starts.

Gobel Sensational, But Raiders Down Oaks 4-3

Oakville Blades' goaltender, Gerry Gobel, almost kept Georgetown Raiders from reaping their revenge Friday night.

Playing one of their most successful games against the Blades, Raiders downed their southern cousins 4-3 despite Gobel's acrobatics. The win was eagerly sought by Georgetown who had been stung 0-4 by the Blades in their previous meeting.

Terry Hay was the big gun for Raiders as he scored two goals and assisted on the winner by Paul Robinson in the third period.

Rearguard Phil Lavell scored the other Raider goal.

Roy Phillips notched a pair of goals to spark the Blades. Doug Desmond got the other Oakville goal.

Gobel turned in key saves, time and time again, particularly in the first two periods when Raiders threatened to turn the game into a rout. Oakville came out of the first period with a 2-1 lead, though Georgetown had 13 shots.

Raiders led 3-2 at the end of the second period.

Georgetown's first goal was a deflected shot by Phil Lavell which hit a leg and bounced into the net.

Oakville came back on two straight goals, the first on a powerplay by Phillips. Centre Bill Perras set up the play.

Desmond got the second Blades' goal from a scramble less than four minutes later.

Hay went to work in the second period and drilled the tying goal home with Blades short-handed. Twenty-seven seconds later he fired a high shot into the top corner to give the Raiders the lead.

It was all Georgetown the rest of the way as the Raiders kept Blades off balance with a tight checking game.

Robinson put the Raiders into a 4-2 lead early in the final period when he scored cleanly on a breakaway during a power play.

Oakville got few direct shots on Ayres until there were less than three minutes remaining and Phillips punched the puck off a Raider forward's stick in front of the Georgetown net to get Blade's third goal.

Tommy Ayres, who made some key stops in the last minutes, kicked out 26 shots while Gobel handled 36.
