Maloney's Hat Trick Sparks Raider Victory

Rick Maloney erupted for three goals and two assists to lead Georgetown Raiders to an 11-1 thumping of the Orangeville Hornets in an OHA Suburban Junior C Hockey game in Georgetown Memorial Arena Sunday.

Maloney did all his scoring in the third period when Georgetown registered five unanswered goals to run their afternoon's production into double figures.

Maloney's line-mate, Terry Hay had a five point day with one goal and four assists, and Bill Dwyer scored once and assisted on three others.

Ron Stewart was a 2-goal man Mike Cummins had a goal and assist, Ron Lane and Brad Johnston counted single goals, and Dave McMenemy, and Rod Presswood collected assists at the points scramble.

McMullen was Orangeville's only marksman, Moore getting the assist.

Raiders fashioned a 4-1 advantage in the first period, built it to 6-1 in the middle period, and then heaped on five crushing goals in the third.

During one burst, Raiders blinked the lamp three times in a span of just 37 seconds.

Georgetown Raiders scored four goals in the first period and then coasted to an 8-2 victory over Orangeville Hornets in an OHA Suburban Junior C League game in Orangeville Thursday night.

Terry Hay jacked it to 3-0 with an unassisted goal at 8:01 and Bill "Hummer" Dwyer registered the fourth Raider goal at 9:59 from Don Norton and Paul Robinson.

Raiders continued unimpeded in the second period until they had a 6-0 cushion. Terry Hay scored his second goal from Lavell at 1:04, and Dave McMenemy counted a goal from Terry Lane at 8:03.

Orangeville Hornets hit quickly for their pair which came just 40 seconds apart. Moore broke the goose egg at 11:18 and Watts from McMullen popped in number 2 at 11:59.

Ron Stewart converted a pass from Norton and Dwyer into Georgetown's 7th goal at 16:45.

Rod Presswood was the third Raider defenseman to contribute to the scoring. He triggered the winners' 8th goal at 6:10 of the final period, Bill Dwyer set up the last scoring play.

7 Deaths Yearly Average On North Halton Roads

An average of seven people are killed and 192 are injured in motor vehicle accidents in the North Halton area every year, according to statistics on file in the Milton Detachment office of the Ontario Provincial Police.

The deaths and the injuries (they range from three to 12 deaths and from 160 to 230 injuries a year) are the result of an average of 495 accidents per year on the highways (and sideroads in North Halton). These crashes account for an average \$268,931 annually in property damage.

The figures are an average of statistics piling up in the O.P.P. files over the past five years. Their records go further back, but for comparison purposes, the writer is taking 1962-66 figures for the basis of the facts presented in this feature.)

For 1966 alone, motorists in the North Halton area patrolled by Milton O.P.P. turned in a below-average year. There were only 483 accidents, only five were killed, 194 were injured and property damage tallied \$286,271.

The decrease in traffic deaths from 1965 (five last year compared to 12 the previous year) produces no great cause for jubilation.

No jubilation, anyway, to the families and loved ones of those five people who died. To them, one fatality was one too many if it wiped out the life of a father, mother, son, daughter, brother, sister or other loved one.

There are 26 men in the Milton O.P.P. Detachment — a sergeant, three corporals and 22 constables. They patrol a total of 367 miles of roads in North Halton including 40 miles of provincial highways (13 miles of Highway 7, 11 miles of

Highway 26, and 16 miles of Highway 401) plus 80 miles of county roads and 247 miles of township roads in Esquimaux and Nassagaweya.

The statistics prove conclusively, three main things:

- (1) Where the most accidents are happening.
- (2) When they are happening and
- (3) Why they are happening.

The answer to Where? is easy. Highway 401 is the "killer strip" in North Halton. During 1966, 165 of the 483 accidents investigated (roughly one out of every three) happened on Highway 401.

TOWN BUYING NEW AMBULANCE

Georgetown is calling tenders for purchase of a new ambulance with the older of the present two vehicles planned to be added to the works department fleet.

A 50% provincial grant on capital and operating costs is now available to volunteer ambulance services such as Georgetown which up to now has footed all costs from the municipal treasury.
