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Prominent in Women's United Church Group

A woman who sang in the choir of St. John's United Church until she was 80, Mrs. A. R. Vannatter died on January 19 at Halton Centennial Manor, Milton. She was 93.

Mrs. Vannatter was prominent in women's groups at the church, and was a life member of the Women's Missionary Society and Women's Association, and of the United Church Women.

The former Cora Alberta, Lymburner, she was the daughter of Hiram Lymburner and Henrietta Sensabaugh and was born at Attercliffe on May 15, 1873. Following her marriage to Alfred Vannatter in 1891, she lived in Ballinacul until 1920, and then in Georgetown. Mr. Vannatter died in 1928.

In 1903 Mrs. Vannatter moved to Milton to make her home at Halton Centennial Manor. She suffered an accident August, breaking her hip and shoulder. After several weeks in Oakville Trafalgar Hospital she returned to the Manor, but never fully recovered from her injuries, and although she did not suffer serious pain or discomfort, was mainly confined to bed.

She leaves one son, Phares L. Vannatter of 16 Durham St., two sisters, Mrs. Fred Lint, Dumville and Mrs. Tom Gilmore, Attercliffe, a granddaughter Mrs. F. R. (Betty Speight) Edwards and two great-grandsons David and Ronald Edwards of Etobicoke.

She was predeceased by a son Frederick Blake Vannatter and daughter Cora (Mrs. A. R. Speight) and a brother Arza Lymburner.

Funeral service on Saturday at the Harold C. McClure Funeral Home was conducted by Rev. Kelvin Johnston of St. Andrew's United Church. Pallbearers were Robert McEnery, Ernest Price, Walter Hyde, Ernest Forgrave, G. K. Urquhart and Claude Kentner. Walter Gray was an honorary pallbearer. Interment was in Greenwood Cemetery, Georgetown.

Georgetown's efforts to get a larger share of fire protection costs from Esquising township has led one resident to tell town council what she thinks of them.

Miss Dorothy Stone, a Cheek Line resident, in a lengthy letter read at Monday's council meeting termed them "ill-advised statements based on misinformation which can disturb feelings between neighbours."
