CREAM RISES TO THE TOP BUT NOT UNTIL 3rd PERIOD

Anybody venturing a small wager that Georgetown Raiders would have a fat edge on the Hamilton Red Wings at the end of the first period Friday night would have picked up a bundle. But there it was in electric lights — Home 4 Visitors 1 after the first twenty minutes of an exhibition meeting of the Junior A and Junior C clubs.

The local Suburban League power was jolted back to reality in the ensuing periods as Eddie Bush's speedsters came on to ring up a 7-4 triumph in front of 1,200 customers. The game, promoted by the Georgetown Minor Hockey Support Group, was a highlight of minor hockey week here.

Raiders still owned a 4-3 margin at the end of two periods but the Detroit farm team tossed in 4 unanswered goals their third time out to bring about the predictable conclusion.

The game was the most exciting this year from a spectator's standpoint.

Raider muscle was augmented by three former Intermediate Raiders, Gerry Inglis, coach of the Juniors, Blake Inglis and Doug Richardson.

Hamilton's Jim Young opened the scoring at 2:25 from Leclerc, and then Georgetown's snipers started on Ron Hoganson understudying Gerry Gray in the Red Wing net. Phil Lavell tied it with an unassisted goal at 5:02. Don Norton made it 2-1 eleven seconds later with help from Gerry Inglis; Blake Inglis jacked it to 3-1 at 12:47 from Richardson and Kent Robinson; and with a little more than two minutes left in the period Mike Cummins, from Richardson and Kent Robinson gave Raiders their 4-1 gap.

Second period goals were scored by Sandy Snow from Jim Adair, and Ron Climie from Brian Gibbons and Fred

die Speck at 6:10 and 7:59 as Red Wings eroded Georgetown's edge.

Speck notched 2, and Rick Morris and Climie one apiece in a ten minute span in the middle of the third period which put the Wings in command.

There were thirteen penalties in the contest, 8 to the Wings, 5 to Raiders. Kevin Pettit checked out of the rink early in the third period after his description of the officiating earned him a misconduct and a game misconduct.

The Georgetown District High School Amateur Radio Station recently went on the air after the erection of a 170 ft. antenna. It is a wave dipole, 130 feet long, cut for the 80 metre band.

The club is using a Heathkit Mohawk receiver and a Heathkit DX-60 transmitter. The transmitter operates on three crystal controlled frequencies: 3.61 megahertz, 3.66 megahertz and 3.7125 megahertz. The school's call number is VE3GHA.

There are three licensed Radio amateurs in the club, VE3FSX, VE3FFZ and VE3FSX.
