

Biehn, Noble are Again Wardens at St. George's

Walter Biehn was re-elected people's warden and Irwin Noble reappointed rector's warden at the annual vestry meeting of St. George's Anglican Church Sunday. The meeting followed an evening service.

The Rev'd Eric Mills, who succeeded the Rev'd John McMullin in December, was chairman for the meeting and the vestry officially welcomed him and his family by motion. An induction service is planned this Sunday morning when Bishop W. E. Bagnall will officiate.

The church ended its year with a small surplus which will form the nucleus of an emergency and building fund. This year's budget includes \$3400 for missions, while a special effort to support the Primate's World Relief fund will be

made by using lenten envelopes.

Highlights of reports presented by church organizations included an Easter mission for children, a series of gospel studies conducted by the Rev'd John McMullin in the spring, painting the kitchen and installation of a new floor in the clubroom and portable partitions for the church school.

Jack Armstrong, Ted Gorth, and Murray Henley were elected delegates to Synod, with Paul Armstrong and Bob Bolland as alternates. Grant Johnson continues as chairman of sidesmen, Mrs. James Costigan as envelope secretary, Tom Parry and Jim Costigan as church school superintendents, Mr. and Mrs. Wallace Thompson as auditors, and Mrs. Ken Ewies as secretary.
