Study Possibility of New Church Parish Hall

The Annual Vestry meeting of St. Alban's Anglican Church was held on Monday, January 23 in the Parish Hall, with the Rev. Harold L. Llewellyn in the chair. In his report to the congregation Mr. Llewellyn stressed the need for greater community fellowship, increased attendance at the services of worship, and a program for young people. He noted that the highlights of 1966 were the paying off of the loan by the Ladies of the Guild and the large Confirmation in March. He also commended the congregation for having met all financial obligations in 1966, in addition to having paid their full Mission Apportionment. A special effort is going to be made in February and March to find out the actual membership of St. Alban's congregation. Thomas Hill was appointed Rector's Warden, Stanley Milne was elected People's Warden. Others elected were Graeme Goebelle as Lay Member of Synod, and Thomas Haines as alternate, Eva Murdock as Vestry Clerk, Sylvia Norton as treasurer, William Service as Chairman of Sidesmen, Robert Heaton, as Maintenance Chairman, Hilda Beaumont as Social Convener, and Edna Korzack as envelope secretary. A special committee was set up to consider the need for a new Parish Hall, and to develop a suggested floor-plan and facilities required. Herb Preston Jr. was later elected chairman of this group. Brenda Reynolds, Annette Milne and Peter Norton were elected to develop and guide a Young People's Program. Mr. Llewellyn announced the following appointments to the Altar Guild — Eva Murdock, Mary Lorrain, Erna Garvin, Mary Hooper, Edna Korzack, Brenda Reynolds, Annette Milne and Lorraine Llewellyn. Honorary members will be Lucy Wagstaffe and Demaris Beattie. Refreshments were provided and served by the Ladies' Guild.

St. Paul's Church Planning For East Georgetown Growth

Following Evensong, on Sunday, January 22, the Annual Vestry of St. Paul's, Norval convened in the Parish Hall, The Rev. Harold L. Llewellyn was chairman for the meeting. In his report to the congregation Mr. Llewellyn stated that a great sense of community had been developed at St. Paul's in 1966, one very tangible result being that all indebtedness was paid and the accepted Mission Apportionment was remitted in full. He stressed that 1967 was going to be a year of growth in East Georgetown, and that this would call for more enthusiasm and alertness on the part of everyone at St. Paul's if they were to share in the development of the area. He called for immediate organization of the laity to provide an early contact with the new residents of Haulton Hills and other parts of Del. rex. He pointed out that very few newcomers are aware that the Anglican congregation of St. Paul's includes the complete area east of the Ninth Line, and south of Highway 7, and that ways and means should be initiated to inform them. A grateful acknowledgement was made to the St. Paul's Ladies' Guild for the gift of altar vestments to arrive early in February. The Warden's Report was given by George Phillips, People's Warden, and showed a healthy financial position. It is not unlikely that East, even with his three quick tricks, will open the bidding. South should get to three or four hearts. If East-West arrive at three spades or four clubs and get doubled, they are in for a poor score. West will lead the club king and will control the clubs. South is in no hurry to take his tricks and should discard his spades on the club lead. When East wins the third club, he will try to cash his spades but South will ruff. When East leads the spade king, he is almost marked with the ace as well. If East has the ace-king of spades and the ace of clubs, then he cannot have a red queen. This would have given him an opening bid. Declare must play West for the doubleton queen of trump and must finesse diamonds through West. When this hand was played at Georgetown, only two declarers out of 12 made ten tricks. I imagine that most Souths ruffed the second club and then could not get a count on East's hand. It pays to watch what the opponents have in the way of high cards, for this often helps place other cards that are still missing. Kerr Says House Plan O.K. Blasts Ontario Grit Leader

Speaking in the Ontario legislature Friday, George Kerr, MPP for Haulton, had words of praise for the Home program announced in the throne speech. He expressed the view, however, that the high cost of housing had resulted, in some degree, from the 16 per cent sales tax on building material and the high cost of borrowing money. Mr. Kerr said that a housing program required planning between the various branches of municipal and provincial governments in order to ensure that properly serviced building lots were available in areas zoned for residential development. All other facilities such as roads, hydro, water, sewage disposal and schools should be made available as soon as development takes place, he said. He suggested that a provincial or national municipal loan fund could be established "so that the physical inter-relationship between housing, roads, works, utility services and recreation facilities may be developed and financed at less cost and with less uncertainty as to carrying charges to meet the tremendous urban growth in many parts of Ontario." This, together with the easing or elimination of taxation on municipal purchasing "may help to provide an increase in residential development at a lower cost." He was sharply critical of a proposal by Liberal leader Robert Nixon that the province assume a much greater share of education costs and responsibility. He blasted the proposal for its vagueness and lack of concrete suggestions about methods of financing. The argument that real estate should not have to bear the burden of education costs because schools are services to persons and not to property was over-simplified, he thought.
