Midgets Capture Group Crown By Downing Preston Twice

Georgetown Midgets defeated Preston twice last week to win the Tri-County 'A' Minor League championship. Preston had upset Bramalea to meet Georgetown in the final.

At Preston, on Tuesday night a combination of poor Georgetown shooting and questionable refereeing, put the locals behind the eight ball, after two periods of play, by 2-0. After a session in the dressing room, the Midgets returned to the ice prepared to play hockey.

Martin Fowler picked up his own rebound and scored to put Georgetown back in the game early in the 3rd period. Dwayne Hay, then tied the game on a pass from Fowler by the midpoint in the period. Jack Kemshead culminated the terrific uphill struggle when he netted the winning goal from the point on a power play with two minutes to go in the game, to give the blue and white a 3-2 win.

An oddity in refereeing occurred with about a minute and a half left in the game, when a Preston player trying to hold the puck in the Georgetown end, froze the puck against the boards. Two Georgetown players covered up on the board. To the amazement of everyone the referee assessed two minor penalties to Georgetown for holding. The remainder of the game was played with the locals playing two men short. Goalie Doug Unsworth made three big saves to preserve the win.

At Georgetown, on Thursday night the MIDGETS built up a 2-0 lead after the first period 5-2 after the second and finished with a flurry to gain a well-earned one-sided 8-2 victory.

Gerry Nash blasted four goals to lead the Georgetown attack. Other goal scorers were Don Zuck, Steve Harris, Dwayne Hay and Bill Bauer. League leading scorer Martin Fowler picked up five assists. Glen Chapman and Jack Kemshead were outstanding on defence.
