Kerr Wants Two-Tier Government for Halton

George Kerr (P.C. - Halton) Friday proposed a "two-tier" system of government for Peel and Halton counties.

Speaking in the legislature's throne speech debate Mr. Kerr said all but one of the municipal councils in the two counties have been hostile to proposals for reorganizing municipal government contained in a report by consultant Thomas Plunkett.

Plunkett suggested the present councils in Peel and Halton be replaced by one rural and one urban administration.

Kerr, whose speech was interrupted by the normal one p.m. adjournment of debate, observed that most of the opposition to the Plunkett recommendations centred on the proposed boundaries between the rural and urban regions.

The "two-tier" system that Kerr is expected to propose would consist of a regional council and local units.

In his plan, individual municipalities would continue to be responsible "for many of the services they have provided in the past, and the regional council would be assigned those functions and responsibility upon which the growth and stability of the region depends."

In dividing the responsibilities, Kerr feels it is important that the vitality of local councils be maintained.

He would discontinue the present county administration, and the regional council would be composed of members of local councils "with the responsibility of direct representation from some rural areas where two or more municipalities may be combined into an electoral district."

Members of the regional council could hold office for two or three years and the chairman at Canadian Legion, Judy, used could be elected from among

Blame Slippery Roads For Many Accidents

Three-year-old Sharon Stone, of 59 Raylawn Cres., was treated for a bump on her head and bruised right knee by a doctor at her home Saturday afternoon after being struck by a car in front of the house.

Police said Sharon ran from in front of a parked truck into the path of a 1964 Valiant operated by Elizabeth Berry of 86 Sargent Rd. The road surface was snow packed and very slippery at the time of the mishap.

The accident was one of five investigated by police this past week. Four of them happened on Friday.

Cars operated by William Grieve, Limehouse, and John Sunnucks, 6 River Dr., came together at the southern entrance to the John St. subway at 5:15 p.m. February 3.

According to police Grieve's 1954 Chev was a total writeoff and Sunnucks' 1964 Chev received \$60 property damage.

One hour earlier a 1966 GMC panel truck owned by Barrage's Cleaners and driven by Ross Earl Walsh, RR 1 Georgetown, and a 1966 Plymouth operated by Oryal Peacock, 18 Rexway Dr., sideswiped on Main St. near Park Ave. Parked cars made the roadway narrow at the point of collision.

The damage estimated was \$70 to the truck and \$125 to the Peacock car.

R. James Forbes, 4 Elm St., was backing out of a driveway onto Back St. and Dennis J. West, 12 Duncan Dr., was driving west on Back St. when they hit at 1:10 p.m.

Forbes' 1958 Chev took \$250 damage and West's 1963 Chev \$150 damage according to police.

A similar accident happened on Maple Ave. W. at 8:10 a.m. where cars operated by Ramsey C. Salter, 32 Maple Ave. W.

and Kathleen Lawson, RR 4, Georgetown collided. Police said Salter was backing out of his driveway and Kathleen Lawson was castbound on Maple. The investigating officer placed damage at \$150 to Salter's 1968 Pontiac and the same amount to Mrs. Lawson's 1967 Chrysler.
