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Twelve Teams in Action for Midget Hockey Tournament

Georgetown's Centennial Midget Hockey tournament gets underway at the Memorial Arena tonight at 7 o'clock. The tourney will run tonight and Friday night and all day Saturday climaxing with consolation championship and grand championship games Saturday evening.

Mayor Joseph Gibbons will open the tourney officially tomorrow night at 6:45 p.m., just before Georgetown Midgets play their first game.

Twelve teams have entered the tourney and each will play at least two games. One loss will put a team into the consolation series, and two losses mean elimination.

There will be an exhibition game at 5:30 p.m. Saturday, February 18.

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Too Few Homebrews Milton Protests Game

The proximity of Halton's court house is an obvious influence on Milton's sport organizations - every time they lose a major case they file an appeal.

Sunday, "protests town" did it again. Aurora Tigers beat the home town Merchants 4-2 in the first game of their Junior C final hockey series, and team manager Al Parion announced minutes later that his club would protest.

"I don't believe in protests," Parion told the press, "but it's a shame when a town of 10,000 people can come into a league and can't find four home brew boys to play."

Failure to dress four Aurora resident players is the crux of the cigar-chewing Milton manager's charge and it appears this time it could be a valid one.

"Aurora's pretty cocksure," he added. "They've been getting away with it all during the regular season, but we can't let them get away with it now."

The protest centres around a player named Larry Dixon. Dixon's was one of 13 names on the Tigers' players' list at game time, but he wasn't in uniform. Referee Jack Shropshire noted

on his report to the OHA that Dixon apparently wasn't in the arena.

Georgetown Bantam Pontiacs earned the right to advance to the next round of OHA playoffs when they defeated Chinguacousy 5-1 in the third game of their set Tuesday Feb. 7.

A Chinguacousy goal early in the game was equalled late in the first period when Ray Inglis tied it up. In the second stanza Jurj Kudrasovs broke the deadlock and pushed Georgetown into a 2-1 lead. Hespeler and Korzak assisting.

Kudrasovs sewed it up with a pair of goals, 11 seconds apart in the third period, and Beaumont hit for the 5th goal.

The victory gave Georgetown the A Minor Championship for the second year in a row.

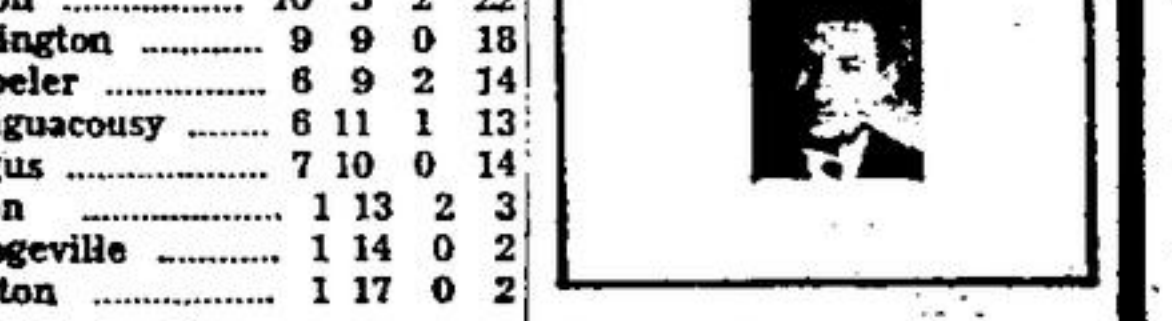
