Retired Domtar Employee Was Veteran of First War

A retired member of the 25 Year Club of Domtar Pulp & Paper, Ltd., Robert Addy, 85, died in Georgetown hospital on February 13.

Mr. Addy was the son of John Addy and Kate Matthews and was born in Deserbury, Yorkshire. He came to Canada in 1912 and lived most of the time since then in Glen Williams. He married Bertha Preston in 1906, at Ravenshorpe, Yorkshire.

He served with the Canadian Army Service Corps in France and Belgium during World War I and was a member of Credit Lodge, AF & AM and Halton Chapter, R.A.M.

He was predeceased by his wife seven years ago. He leaves three children, Jack of Georgetown, Mrs. Fred Enzley (Alice) and Raymond of Glen Williams; six grandchildren and five great-grandchildren.

He was a member of Glen Williams United Church and Rev. Walter Ridley conducted the funeral service last Wednesday at the Harold C. McClure Funeral Home. A Masonic service was held the previous evening.

Pallbearers were Clayton Allen, George Preston, Robert Preston, Douglas Latimer and grandsons Robert Addy, Toronto, and Roger Addy, London. Interment was in Glen Williams Cemetery.

Police Searching for Man Missing for Fourth Week

North Halton OPP are still scouring this part of the county for a clue to the whereabouts of Phillip A. Charlton, a Milton resident who has been missing since January 25.

Mr. Charlton, age 55, father of three, failed to return home from an afternoon shift at the P. L. Robertson Plant in Milton where he works.

Born and educated in Milton, Mr. Charlton spent over two years in a German concentration camp during the last war after his capture in a Dieppe raid.

He left the service May 1945 and took up a position as a custodian officer at Guelph Reformatory. Two years later he returned to Milton to work at the P.L. Robertson plant.

"Foul play is not suspected as yet," a police spokesman said this week.

LET'S PLAY BRIDGE

The ability to make over-tricks is a big asset at duplicate bridge. You get the best score by making more points than any other pair who played the same cards as you did. It doesn't matter by how much your score is better as long as it is better. The difference can be ten points or 2,000 points.

This ability can pay off at rubber bridge, though. If you and your partner bid aggressively, as you should, the knowledge of how to get extra tricks can come in very handy.

Here is a hand that came up at a duplicate bridge game. East is the dealer and North-South are vulnerable.

West led the four of diamonds and dummy was spread. Before a card is played declarer should make a plan. There are obviously 11 tricks there for the taking. If you hope to make any extra tricks, you should plan your play now. The only suit that holds any hope is clubs. The diamond king may be needed for an entry, so win the opening lead in South's hand.

Now you lead a club to the ace, take the king and lead a small club. This should be ruffed high. Now take two rounds of trump, keeping the lead in dummy. Since trumps split three-two, there is no problem. Another club is led and ruffed high again.
