

Cairn, Essay Contest Decided for Centennial

The Glen Williams Centennial Committee met recently to consider various suggestions submitted to them for suitable Centennial projects.

It was definitely decided that a Centennial Cairn would be erected at a suitable place in front of the Glen Williams Public School. It was also agreed that the old school bell would be mounted on top of the Cairn. Mr. Merle Reid was appointed to supervise this project.

It was also decided that all school children residing in Glen Williams will be invited to enter a Centennial Essay Writing Contest. All contestants will be required to provide an essay on the subject "Glen Williams 1867 to 1967"—comprising no more than 2,000 words. There will be two competing classes

— the Juniors, those 12 years of age or under as of April 1, 1967 — and the Seniors, those 13 years of age and over as at the same date. There will be a prize for each of the two classes. Those children wishing to enter the contest are to contact the Rev. Harold L. Llewellyn, at the Anglican Rectory in Glen Williams, telephone 877-9128. The closing date for receiving the essays will be midnight April 15, 1967, and the decision of the judges will be final.

Other suggestions received include those for a Kite Flying Contest, new street signs, a park on Old Timers Row, a Garden Party and the wearing of old fashioned clothes, and these are being further considered at future meetings of the Centennial Committee.

Lunch Room Supervision For Four Public Schools

With the establishment of lunch room supervisors in four of the public schools, teachers have been relieved of this duty.

This service has been set up at Chapel Street, Kennedy, Wrigglesworth and Centennial schools. Only children who cannot go home for lunch are allowed to stay.

At one of the schools there are auxiliary classes, with pupils coming from all over town. While at Centennial senior public school, where there are only Grades seven and eight, the students also come from a wide area. At Wrigglesworth school only children from the Mountain view Road - River Drive area may stay.

In all these cases transportation would have to be provided if the children were not allowed to stay for lunch.

Four women, Mrs. J. Emmerston at Chapel Street, Mrs. G. Chaplin at Wrigglesworth, Mrs. R. Awrey at Centennial, and Mrs. R. Wilson at Kennedy, watch over the students while they eat lunch, and afterwards while they read, play chess, checkers, or watch TV. "Their function is to keep order," says Board secretary James Evans.

Hog Output Drops 10% in Last Year

Over 22,000 hogs were produced in Halton County last year but the number represented a ten per cent decrease on 1965, Halton County Hog Producers' annual meeting was told Wednesday.

The decrease reflected a general downward trend in Ontario and Canada last year. The national decrease was 3.1 per cent with a Provincial drop of 1.6 per cent for a total of 2,500,000 hogs.

Provincial president Ben Steers told Halton producers that Canadian exports in pork products had decreased "quite substantially." Imports were up.

Mr. Steers said the bulk of the 22 million pound import increase came from the U.S.

"Whether that's an indication that American hogs are getting better and we are looking with more favour on them or not, I don't know," he added.

Despite the lower national production figures there was an increase of 42 per cent grade A hogs. The Ontario increase was higher at 43.3 per cent.

There was a six per cent increase in grade A hogs in Halton.

"Consumption of pork has remained about the same as it was," Mr. Steers said. "Increases in the sale of pork products has been brought about mainly due to the increase of the population in the country."
