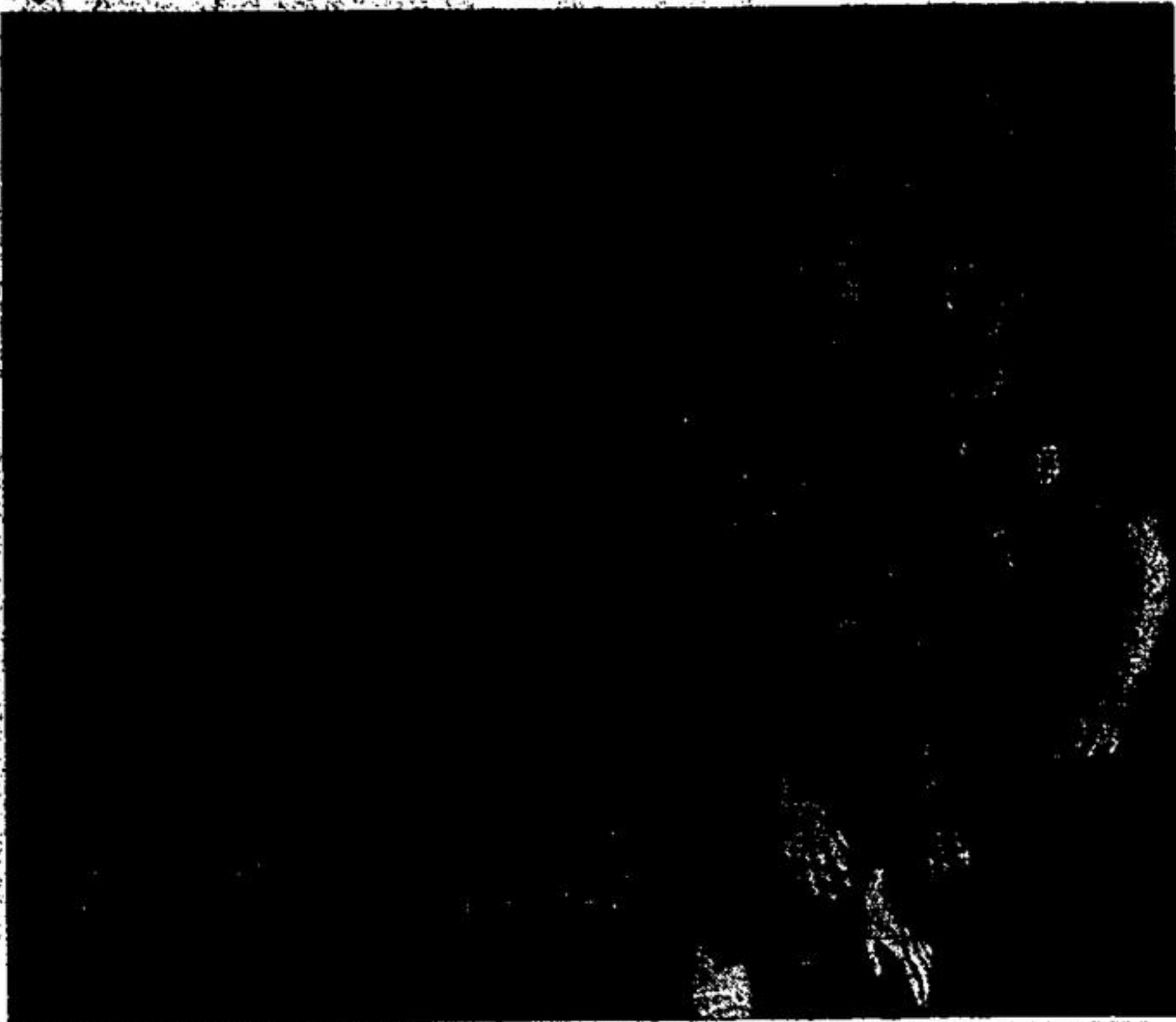

Georgetown Curlers Split Sunday Games

Georgetown curlers won a game and lost a game in Tri-County Curling League Action in Orangeville Sunday. The Georgetown rinks from the North Halton Club registered their 6th loss of the season when their point total fell short of that amassed by their competition on the day, Brampton.

New Arena Suits Tigers First Game Trims Raiders

About 400 of the crowd of 1470 paying customers didn't celebrate the opening of Aurora's spanking new arena Sunday afternoon. That was the strength of the Georgetown contingent which watched their Raiders falter on the large ice surface and surrender the first game of the Suburban Junior C League final to the Aurora Tigers 5 to 1.

The 85 by 190 ft. surface, a few feet shorter than the Maple Leaf Gardens sheet, was to the Tigers liking even if it did give Raiders some problems.

Aurora fashioned a 3-1 lead in the first period, and added single goals in the remaining periods to carry off the opener.

Roy Pugh, John Gould and goalie Jim Rutherford were the spark plugs of the Tiger attack. Rutherford was the key player in the first period pulling off two big stops on clean cut scoring chances.

Raiders had a big edge in shots in the first session but most of them were from too far out to be effective.

Georgetown looked capable of erasing the two goal deficit as they started the second period with a threatening attack, but the 4th Aurora goal on a breakaway by Carleton took a lot of the sting out of the visitor's offense.

Raiders in the third period were never able to regain the spark that made them outthrust

the Tigers in the first period and early part of the second.

Gould scored the first two goals of the game at 8:49 and 12:28. Mike Alcorn and Burnell Weir assisted on the first one and Roy Pugh and Dave Coty on the second.

Gary Carleton's breakaway goal at 9:17 of the second was made possible by a pass from puck eater Larry Reid with the 5th Tiger goal at 5:36 of the third.

Merchants Protest Two Aurora Players Ineligible

Milton has lodged a formal protest with the Ontario Hockey Association Friday over Aurora's failure to register defenceman John Boyce and forward John McClain as waiver players.

The written protest and \$50 protest fee was delivered to the Toronto offices of the OHA.

On the ice, Aurora eliminated the Milton team in just five games of the best-of-seven series.

Milton decided to lodge the protest after a speedometer check by executive member Murray Whistler indicated Tottenham was just 16 miles from Bradford and 22 from Aurora.

Under Ontario Hockey Association rules, Boyce and McClain would have had to either play with or be waived by Bradford to join the Tigers and would then have to be registered as waiver players.

In junior C ranks, players must play for the closest team, unless the difference in distance between two teams is less than five miles.

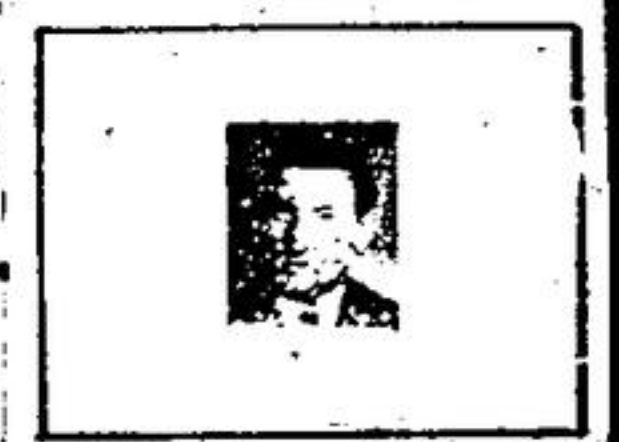
