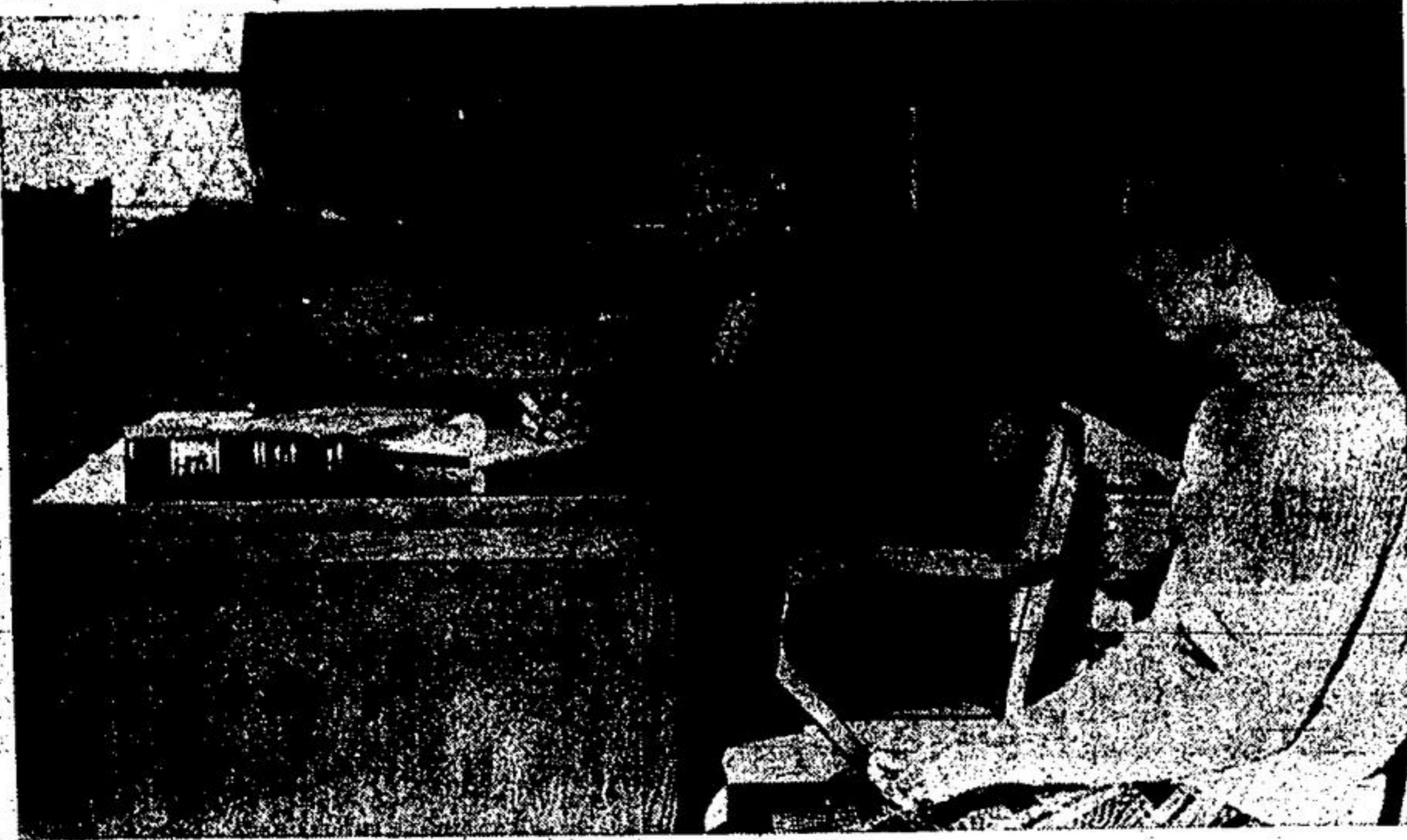


Treason's Treason And That's That . . .

"JUDGE" JOHN ORD LISTENS TO THE TESTIMONY OF Julie Rundle during the retrial of Canadian insurgent Louis Riel at Park Public School. The Grade 8 pupils re-enacted the trial with a judge, jury, lawyers for the defense and prosecution and a flock of witnesses. Riel led rebels of the Red River settlements and headed a provisional government of their founding (1869-70). His followers felt the transfer of Hudson Bay Co. land to Canada threatened their rights. The rebellion collapsed without bloodshed.

They listened to all the evidence related to the treason charge then reached the same conclusion as their Saskatchewan counterparts. Thus poor Louis was sentenced to hang a second time.

Police Fines Totalled \$14,000 In February

Close to \$14,000 in fines was imposed by Georgetown police during February a month-end report released this week reveals.

Infractions of the Highway Traffic Act accounted for \$2,564, the Liquor Control Act fines amounted to \$420, Criminal Code \$158, and local by-laws \$100.

Police put in 1,709 hours in cruiser patrol and 458 hours on foot.

There were 16 reportable and 13 non-reportable accidents in February resulting in 9 persons being injured.

Criminal code charges totalled 5, Liquor Control Act 9, Highway Traffic Act 103, and parking violations 411.

Complaints investigated totalled 82 utilizing 2,021 man hours.

Two persons were arrested, and summonses served to 54.

There were two major theft twenty premises found insecure and 36 unoccupied house checks.

Thirty-one hours were spent in court by Georgetown police.

Government Contract For Electron Tubes

Ottawa (Special): A Georgetown firm has been awarded a contract by the Dept. of Defence Production. Industry minister C. M. Drury announced here that Varian Associates of Canada Ltd. will supply electron tubes to the value of \$22,924.

The contract is one of 92 unclassified defence contracts, totalling \$10,533,000 awarded by the department.

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
