Future Will See Senior School in West Georgetown

Georgetown Public School Board intends to create a second senior public school, this one to serve the west end of town but it wouldn't come about until the enrollment conditions and teaching space are right for it. That, in effect, was the message in a statement issued to the press by the Georgetown Public School Board Wednesday night. It was in response to a petition from forty families in the Park Public School area requesting the board to consider such a school for the west end. Advantages for the pupils included in this type of grade 7 and 8 schooling. "However, in the case of the Park School area the board must remember the effect this type of change would have on Grades 1 to 6 in the Park School, or any other school which may be affected by the suggested change." "Since beginning Centennial School it has been the board's intention to provide the same type of Grades 7 and 8 arrangement in the west end of town as soon as the expected changes occur which will make a Senior Public School more "feasible". "The petition received will not be forgotten."

At present, the Georgetown public school system includes one senior public school, Centennial Public School, located between Harrison and George Kennedy schools. It opened its doors last fall taking grades 7 and 8 pupils from Harrison and Kennedy areas. Those two schools were left as junior public schools with grades from Kindergarten to 6.

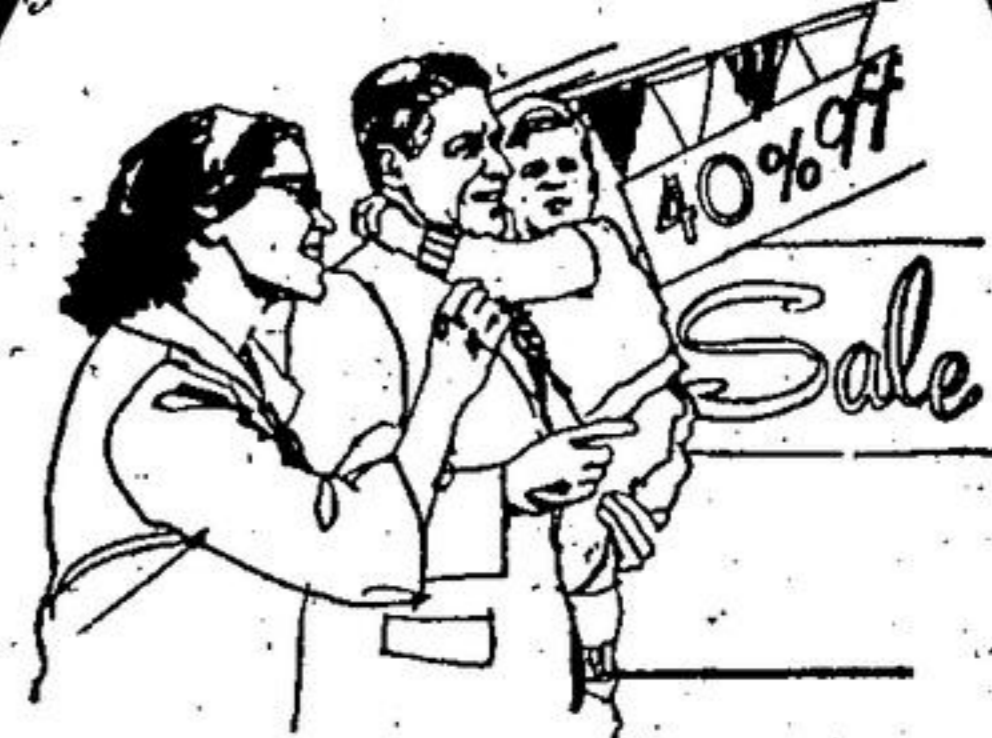
The senior school uses the rotation class system in the afternoons. During the mornings the pupils stay in their home rooms and are taught the basic or "core" subjects, mathematics, etc., by their home room teacher. But during the afternoons the classes change rooms and teachers to get the advantage of extra knowledge from teachers who specialize in the remaining subjects.

The board's statement reads, "The board agrees with the Park area petitioners that a senior public school has certain
