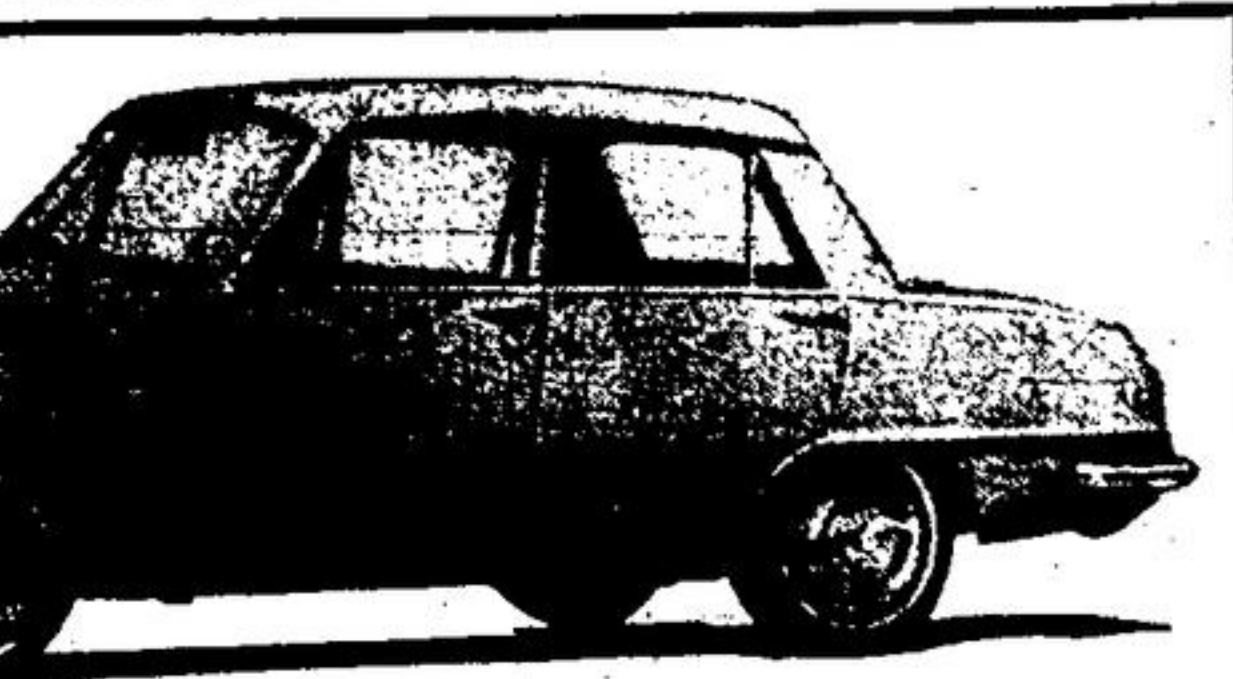

Challenges Council Explain Treatment Of Police Chief

Jim McCaig, 37 Maple Ave. West, challenged council to explain their treatment of Chief of Police Roy Haley, at Monday's night's council meeting.

Mr. McCaig stated the Chief had requested an investigation into his capabilities, which he felt had been questioned over the past two years. "Why was he refused," asked Mr. McCaig. "Any man should be given a trial before he is convicted. Our council was afraid of what might come out?" demanded Mr. McCaig.

He recalled the offer of seven thousand dollars to the Chief to retire, "if you have this kind of money I look for a decrease in taxes."

Switching to Cedarvale Community Board, he stated that Reeve Hunter's requests for financial reports must be gratifying to members of the Board who serve with no pay.

Concluding his criticism, he added "If you people did what you said you were going to do before election, Georgetown would be a better place to live."

Cr. Fred Harrison stated he had only promised to do his best, and he felt he had that. He contended that the seven thousand dollars offered to the Chief was severance pay, "a common practice especially where there is no pension plan" added Cr. Harrison.

Deputy Reeve Arthur Speight remarked that all deputations should be thanked for coming since they acted as a sounding board of public opinion. "We can ask ourselves, 'Are we do-

ing the right thing?" commented Deputy Reeve Speight.

The mayor told Mr. McCaig that it would be indiscreet to go into the matter at this time.

Later in the meeting a motion was passed authorizing the Police Chairman to obtain the service of Joseph Sedgewick, Q.C.
