A former Georgetown resident, Frank Parmeter of Windsor was a weekend visitor with Mr. and Mrs. Jack Coburn, 31 King St. E.



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\$4650 Property Damage in District Accidents

A theft of tools from the property of H. Laird, Norval, was one of thirty general occurrences reported to the North Halton OPP this week. The district detachment also made four liquor seizures resulting in four charges preferred under the Liquor Control Act, four premises were found insecure at night, and three abandoned vehicles were removed from the highways.

During the week the 4 property damage accidents and 1 injury accident were investigated, resulting in 1 person being injured and approximately \$4,650 in property damage. Causes of accidents were 'inattentive driving', 'fail to yield' and 'animal crossing highway'. As a result of accidents, 4 persons were charged with driving offences.

During the period March 5th to March 11th, 1967, inclusive, personnel of the Detachment, worked a total of 843 hours, and during this period a total of 8,055 miles were patrolled on area highways. As a result of patrol, 65 traffic charges were laid and 123 traffic violation warnings were issued, as well as 37 convictions registered.
