

RAIDERS FALTER, BENGALS WIN SUBURBAN FINAL IN SIX GAMES

A drooping banner on the west end Memorial Arena wall read "Go Raiders Go" — but the Raiders had already gone. The electric score board beside it blinked out the sad tale — V 8-1.

Backchecking had done it for the Aurora Tigers. They played their best game of the OHA Suburban Junior C best of 7 series in the final game Friday night.

It earned them the group trophy and the Pete McMullen trophy an award created this year in memory of the late Milton sportsman, Milton Merant club president. Dave Rush gave the victors their silk at centre ice as soon as the siren signalled the end of the Raider campaign.

Eleven hundred people most of them hockey fans passed by the ticket box before a Fire Marshall's officer regulation used the doors and left the smouldering on the front steps.

The customers not particularly interested in what went on

at ice level, were punks, most of the local grown variety, who looked on the whole thing as a good place to exhibit their stupidity. Brawling in the crowd started even before the teams hit the ice.

One incident underlined the type of jackass logic that goes on in the narrow space between the ears of the breed. Two young men came all the way from Toronto to cheer Raiders on. They were wearing Toronto hockey crests on team jackets. When they left the arena their jackets were ripped and one wore a cut that needed stitching. Home town toughs had "welcomed" what they figured to be a couple of Aurora fans.

For Raiders trailing the group final 3 games to 2 the game was a do or die affair. It took Aurora Tigers a little over three minutes to make the situation desperate.

By the end of the first period Aurora had Raiders on the ropes with a 3-0 lead. They added a single goal late in the second period, and outscored Georgetown 4-1 in the third.

Gould, Carleton and Alcorn led the Tigers with two goals a piece. McLean and Holancin scored the others. Bill Dwyer was the only Raider able to fool Aurora's nimble netminder Jim Rutherford.

A tally showed Georgetown bettered Aurora in the shots on goal department but as in the most of the other games in the set Raider shots were either from too far out or lacked sting.

Georgetown's two wins were fashioned by dominating the play and throwing so much rubber in Aurora's direction that some had to find holes in Rutherford's armour. Tigers on Friday were checking too well for that tactic to succeed a third time.

Holancin from Bray counted the first goal. Gould piled on the second with an unassisted dash at 8:21, and Carleton from Gould at 15:25 put Georgetown in trouble. Gould slipped the 4th goal under a sprawled Larry Reid at 16:17 of the middle period.

The game was 49 minutes old

when Georgetown backers got their reason to cheer. Rod Presswood and Rick Maloney were in on the play that Bill Dwyer finished at 9:35 of the third.

Gary Carleton killed any renewed ideas of spectacular finish that danced in Georgetown heads with his second goal of the game Tigers 5th, 25 seconds later. Aurora was at their powerful best in the next few minutes. Alcorn from Coty clicked at 15:53 and 16:25, and McLean steered Bellamy's shot past Reid at 17:34.

Georgetown Raiders on Friday, March 10th were not the sharp, overwhelming band that jockeyed for the top step of their junior league throughout the 66-67 campaign. There have been Sundays when the red and white would have confounded Junior B troops. But this wasn't one of them.

Georgetown Raiders have been a scrapping club. That's the way they checked out. They were still scrapping for their second goal when the siren signalled the start of spring.
