

Record Turnout Votes Dominion Party to Power

The fifth annual Model Parliament will be held on March 30-31, 1967, at Bramalea Secondary School. This year, it has been designated as a "Centennial" event, and delegates from Toronto, Ottawa, Kitchener, London, Montreal and Tillsonburg will join the 14 member schools of the Intercollegiate Council for Halton - Peel (ICCHP).

It was hoped to have forty members from Quebec, but increased study resulting from the teachers' strike cut down this number drastically. Nevertheless, the event promises to be a great success under the capable guidance of Dale Philpott and M. Stuart Martin, the directors.

As in past years, the parliament will consist of two parties, Dominion and National. The final results are inconclusive, since both parties have in the vicinity of 81 members. The National Party, whose leader is Bryan Frank of Port Credit, will form the government, but could conceivably be toppled by the Dominion Party.

At GDHS, the elections were

held on Jan. 31st, and the Dominion Party gained 80.8 per cent of the total vote and 71 per cent of the student body vote, again a record in the Halton-Peel area.

The election was run "objectively," that is, candidates were chosen by the authorities in advance and took turns representing either party in front of history and civics classes. Since six of these students (Tony McAuley, Richard Enright, Doug Stephens, Don Young, Alex Goudeketting, Roger Smith) had previously chosen Dominion as their preference, there was no problem in allocating parties to delegates.

Robert Saxe, Andy Spiece, Lesley Buresh and Mark Irwin chose National as their party. This 5-4 split was decided by the student body in the election results.

The Dominion Party had campaigned on a moderate platform of stable economy, moderate foreign investment, maintenance of Canada's military commitments, an expanded peace force (UN) and Free Trade with the United States. They

sought to modernize the BNA Act without altering our basic form of government.

The National Party believed in reducing the size of the armed forces and their involvement in NATO and NORAD, cutting down on US investment in Canada, and abolishing the present form of government in favour of a republic.

Lesley Buresh and Robert Saxe attended the National Cabinet meetings, and their positions in the government will be revealed at a later date.

The Rt. Hon. Roger Smith was elected as Leader of the Opposition by the Dominion Caucus. His personal secretary will be Douglas Stephens, the Minister of Trade and Commerce is the Hon. Tony McAuley, the Minister of Manpower is the Hon. Richard Enright and the Minister of Industry is the Hon. Alex Goudeketting.

In March, the school learned that one more student per school could attend to replace the French Canadian delegation. John Riley was elected, since he had been a member of the

Model Parliament Committee. He will represent the Dominion Party, and will lead the "Mount Royal" delegation composed of all such added members in northern Halton and Peel. He joined the Cabinet as a Minister without Portfolio.
