

# Township Sanitary Landfill Permission Asked by Acton

Headed by Mayor Les Duby, Acton council, appeared before Esqueuing Council, Monday night, urging quick action on the town's request for permission to operate a sanitary disposal area in town-owned property within the township of Esqueuing.

At present Esqueuing has a by-law prohibiting the operation of dumps within the township. This by-law would have to be amended to concur with Acton's request.

"Most of you have visited this site, and have verbally stated that you saw no reason why this kind of operation could not be developed in this area, if properly controlled, either by land fill or confined incineration method," stated Mayor Duby.

The Acton mayor emphasized the urgency of the situation, saying they could no longer continue their operation in its present location.

In answer to a question from Deputy-Reeve George Currie, Mayor Duby said he was willing to discuss any site if this one was found unsuitable to Esqueuing.

Cr. A. Drinkwater of Acton, however, explained that the town had both Ontario Water Resources Commission, and Health Unit approval for this proposed site, and any change in site could set back the scheme by up to six months.

Reeve George Leslie reminded Acton council by plane and delegation both from the town of Acton and the township of Esqueuing, came to council opposing the scheme.

Mayor Duby replied that the delegation had been upset about possible smoke in the area.
