One of this district's oldest residents, Mrs. John Courcier Cook, 93, died on March 13 in Peel Memorial Hospital, Brampton.

Born at Silvercreek, she was the former Henrietta Maude Clark, daughter of James Clark and Margaret Crawford. She had lived in this district most of her life, after her marriage at RR 4, Georgetown, and for the past three years with her daughter at Caledon.

Mrs. Cook was a member of Union Presbyterian Church and a life member of the Women's Missionary Society. Her husband, whom she married in 1909 in Toronto, died in 1937.

She leaves four children, Jack of Bowmanville, Clifford of Georgetown, William of Belfountain and Enid, Mrs. W. E. McBride of Caledon; eleven grandchildren and five great-grandchildren. The last member of her family, she was predeceased by six brothers.

Rev. Robert Duncanson conducted the funeral service at the Harold C. McClure Funeral Home and interment took place in Glen Williams Cemetery. Takes Over Part Of Jackson's Store Business

One of Georgetown's newest merchants is Norman Cohen, who has taken over the men's, boys' and footwear department at Jackson's Bargain Centre on Main Street.

Mr. Cohen purchased this part of the business from Mrs. Sol Sherman, whose husband died suddenly last fall.

Since coming to town the first of February, he has made major alterations to the whole main floor of the store with new clothing racks, and fixtures to give an entire "new look" for shoppers.

Week's Highway Patrol Totals 7815 OPP Miles

During the period March 12th to 18th, 1967, inclusive, personnel of the North Halton detachment, Ontario Provincial Police, worked a total of 823 hours and patrolled a total of 7,815 miles on area highways. As a result of patrol 48 traffic charges were laid and 53 traffic violation warnings were issued, as well as 66 convictions registered.

Over this period there were 9 property damage accidents and 2 injury accidents investigated, resulting in 3 persons being injured and approximately \$7,250.00 in property damage. Causes of accident were "Careless Driving," "Speed Too Fast," "Fail to Yield," animal crossing highway and adverse road conditions. As a result of accidents, five persons were charged with driving offences.

There were 23 general occurrences reported, consisting of Theft of Tools from a house under construction in Esquesing Twp., 1 Break and Enter at Halton Railway Association in Nassagaweya Twp., 1 liquor seizure resulting in 5 charges under the Liquor Control Act, 2 in Glen Williams Cemetery, stolen vehicles recovered for other forces, 3 abandoned vehicles removed from the highway, 1 impaired driver charged, and 1 missing person located. The remaining occurrences were of a minor nature.

Church School Children Plan Aid for Hospital

A group of nine, ten and eleven year olds from St. Alban's Anglican Church, Glen Williams have pooled their pennies to provide picture and story books for the children in Georgetown & District Hospital, and are impatiently waiting for the day they take them to the sick children.

The Thursday night senior church school children have been putting their pennies in a box for this purpose. "The Hospital Helpers" as they call themselves consider this part of their public service, and run the whole operation themselves. They will call on Rev. Harold Llewellyn for help when they go shopping for the books, and probably for transportation to the hospital.

The idea was their own, and is part of their "Thinking of Others" project.
