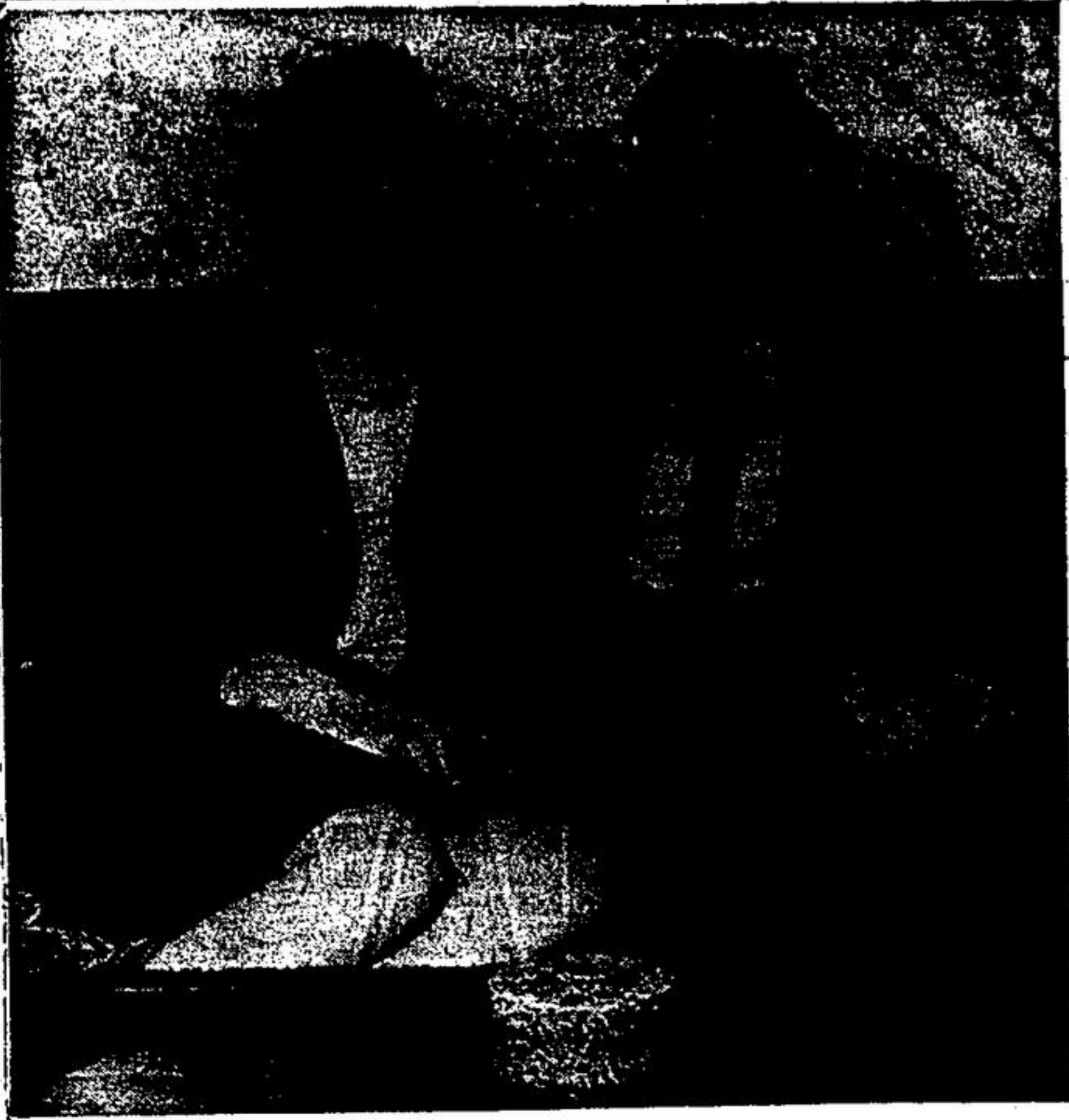


**PARTED AS CHILDREN**

**Acton Reeve Critical About Children's Aid**

The Children's Aid Society of Halton County is operating illegally, Acton Reeve Herbert Hinton, charged last week.

Reeve Hinton, a past warden told county council the Society had "flouted its constitution" by not revealing its 1967 budget plans to its members at the annual meeting held here last week.

The irate Reeve also contended adjustments made to the Society's by-laws to bring them into line with the recent Child Welfare Act, were also mishandled.

NO WARNING

He complained members were not given warning of the move.

"They flouted their constitution in bringing forward these amendments in complete defiance of the orders of procedure laid down in their charter," he claimed.

"This makes it illegal and their procedures from now on will be illegal until this is done properly," he said.

"This gets into an area of irresponsibility that council elected by the people, could not condone."

Reeve Hinton added: "It is very, very poor operations by our Children's Aid directors."

One councillor, Milton Reeve Austin Ledwith, was appointed president of the board.
