**Extend Natural Gas Service To Glen Williams Residents**

Residents in the middle section of Glen Williams village will have natural gas made available to them later this year. It has been disclosed by the local office of the United Gas Co. Local manager Alex Blackwell said the gas service will be extended to that area between the west branch of the Credit River paralleling the 9th Line and where it passes through the middle of the village. Rather than take the gas line across the river at the 9th line bridge it is likely the service will be extended north on the 9th line and into the village along a sideroad at the top of the hill.

**Anticipate Red Cross to Better Last Year Campaign**

Receipts from the door to door canvass made in Georgetown last week by the Red Cross Society are now slightly ahead of the total receipts from the same canvass last year, and a few more contributions are still to be expected.

Canvass of the out of town areas is not yet complete, nor are the total receipts from business, industry and the professions yet available, but the prospects for topping last year's total of \$3,400 look to be fair.

Out of town, the best returns so far have been from Stewartville, Area Captain Mrs. Glen Denning, with a total of \$332.

There is a new revolution in public education for Canada's mentally retarded — "Flowers of Hope."

This year, Canada's Centennial, Canadian Retarded Children's Week and the "Flowers of Hope" program will be conducted from May 14 to 21 inclusive.

Through the program, Canadian householders will be receiving a "Flowers of Hope" message and gifts of flowers — the Cosmos which is Canada's Centennial annual flower.

These little folders are assembled by the mentally retarded for planting by those who receive them — hoping that those who do will give a thought, to the mentally retarded in their community. Most local Associations undertake the "Flowers of Hope" campaign as a fund raising project. The money raised through this campaign provides the local Association with the operating funds required to carry on their vital work on behalf of the mentally retarded in the area.
