

Model Parliament Honours For GDHS and Roger Smith

Georgetown did well at model parliament session in Bramalea Secondary School which concluded Friday.

Georgetown High School's ten member delegation was judged to be the best delegation attending, and GDS student Roger Smith was judged to have made the best individual contribution. Roger was Leader of the Opposition.

Ontario's Education Minister William Davis officially opened the model House of Commons Wednesday, but after that it was entirely the students' show.

Mr. Davis, acting as Governor General, read a politically loaded Throne speech to get the ball rolling and he had hardly left the floor before the junior politicians showed that they had learned something from their counterparts in Ottawa.

A motion of non-confidence was introduced by Opposition leader Roger Smith on the Go-

vernment's declaration of a complete armed forces unification policy.

For almost an hour it was dog eat dog as members fought back and forth in typical political style.

Cries of 'shame,' 'hypocrisy,' and 'over my dead body,' promised a long, drawn out session, as both the National Party, in power, and the Dominion Party, in opposition, accused each other of stalling the country's progress.

No students' parliament would be complete without the familiar desk-thumping of the original House sessions. The students had a good time for the first hour proving that no politician in Ottawa could bang his desk any harder than they could and for a while it sounded as if construction work had started in Bramalea Secondary auditorium.

Everyone settled down for

some serious discussion with the defeat of the motion of non-confidence and the introduction of proposed legislative bills.

The entire program was sponsored by a student organization, the Inter-Collegiate Council for Halton and Peel made up of United Nations clubs in both counties' secondary schools.

Of the \$2,000 required to hold the parliament, \$1,500 was raised by the students themselves. The province-wide program is the ICCHP's centennial project.

For the parliament, the National Party was voted into power as a result of elections held in Peel and Halton schools.

One hundred and fifty students took part in the session.

When it was over the students sat down and discussed problems and solutions to, did model parliaments yet to come.

District Jerseys Among Milk Production Leaders

Rosegate Susan 4 classified Very Good — Jersey cow bred by Sterling Brown and Sons, Harvey Station, N.B., and owned by Ernest Alexander, Norval, has just been issued a Lifetime Production Certificate. In 8 lactations she produced 91,272 lbs. milk, 4,295 lbs. fat. Susan 4 is a daughter of the Superior and Century Sire Brampton Sixth Generation, and also a winner of a Ton of Gold certificate.

Rosegate Castor Charm 2 Very Good, another Jersey cow in the herd of Mac Alexander, Norval, has just been issued a Ton of Gold certificate. In 1361 days she produced 2,035 lbs. of fat. She is a daughter of the Senior Superior Sire Kingshurst Beally Royal Castor — and a winner of 2 Silver Medals and a Gold Medal.

Lindale Bijou Gladys — Very Good, a Jersey cow bred and owned by M.C. Bealy, Milton, has just been issued a Lifetime Production Certificate. In 8 lactations she produced 75,365 lbs. milk, 4,324 lbs. fat. She is a daughter of the Superior Sire Brampton Sir Bijou Radar and a winner of 3 Gold Medals.

Lindale Echo Nancy, Excellent, another Jersey cow in the same herd has been issued a Ton of Gold certificate. In 1461 days she produced 2,083 lbs. of fat. She is the daughter of Sen-

ior Superior Sire Lindale Beau Echo — and also a winner of 2 Silver Medals.

Radar's Eleanor 8 R Very Good, a Jersey cow in the herd of Bruce Nixon, Norval, has been issued a Ton of Gold certificate. In 1398 days she produced 2,124 lbs. fat. She has also a Silver Medal.

In the same herd of Bruce Nixon, Norval, Radar's Vale Lady 8B Very Good has just been awarded a Ton of Gold. In 1458 days she produced 2,232 lbs. of fat.

To qualify for a Ton of Gold a cow must produce at least 2,000 lbs. of fat in 4 consecutive years.
