Offer Inducements to Join North Halton Golf Season

North Halton golf membership without the need of initiation fee during 1967. Term members are permitted to continue their memberships at initiation fee rate.

The incentive plan is based on a reduction in fees. It works like this:

New members who have not been members before may join

Here's how it breaks down: All members who are not shareholders will pay the initiation rate — couple \$172, man \$116, lady \$86.

An additional incentive is being offered groups of four who join together.

Four memberships will be given for the price of three, providing the four join together, and none of the applicants were golf members in 1966. This arrangement further reduces the new rate as follows: couple \$123, man \$87 and lady \$64.

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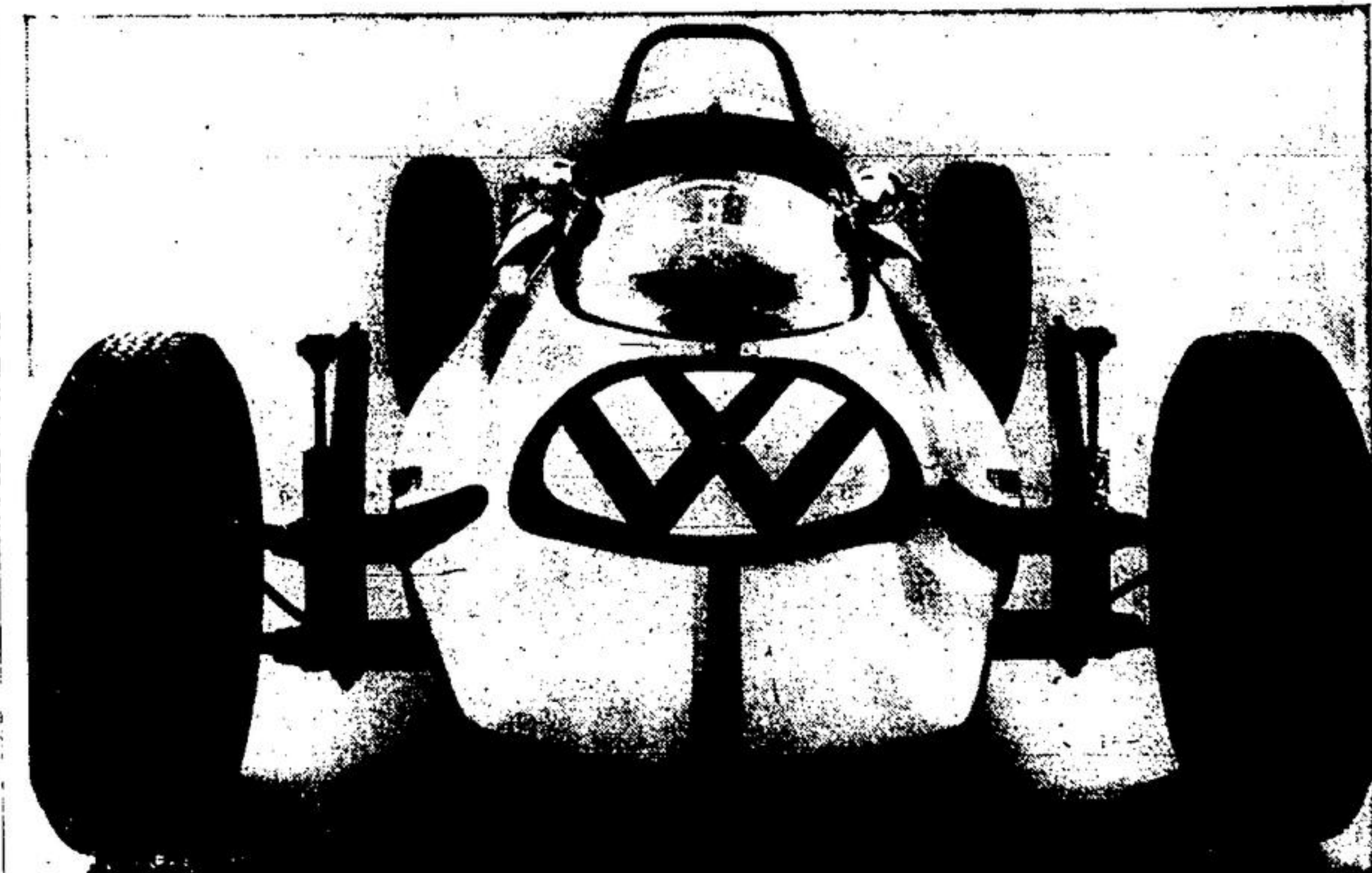
