## Collide with Gravel Truck Two Young Milton Men Die

Two young men died early Monday morning in the tangled wreck of their car in a smash on the Base Line near Hornby.

The pair, Bruce Robert Kelman, 19, Milton, and John Hall Reid, RR 2, Milton, died instantly when their car came into collision with a loaded works department truck driven by Robert William Dunn, of RR 1, Streetsville.

The narrow Base Line road was blocked for over an hour as police and ambulance men attempted to free the trapped bodies of the men.

The truck was loaded with sand and heading east on the road.

The two bodies were slumped in the front seat of the car under the dashboard.

Cars and trucks were forced down to a crawl as police took measurements and photographs of the scene.

A police report stated that the youths' car was being driven west towards Milton at the time of the accident. Apparently it was following another works department truck and skidded sideways across the road when the brakes were applied.

## First Grass Fire Near Lincoln Motors

It was almost a tie for the first grass fire of 1967. Georgetown firemen were still dousing burning grass in the industrial park property behind Lincoln Motors, Saturday, when the sirens signalled the second blaze.

Some of the department members left the first fire to rush to the second on 27 sidewalk near Terra Colla.

Firemen had little trouble dousing either.

The cause of the first was undetermined, but witnesses told Fire Chief Erwin Lewis that a car with three youths was stopped at roadside shortly before the second was discovered.

## AUTOPSIES HELD ON TWO YOUTHS AND DIABETIC

Autopsies on the two victims of Monday's early morning traffic fatality near Hornby, and the Milton diabetic who was found frozen to death were performed by Dr. V. R. Waldorf, pathologist at Oakville-Trafalgar Memorial Hospital. The written reports have not yet been received by Milton coroner Dr. George E. Syer, however.

The accident victims, Bruce Robert Kelman, 19 and John Hall Reid, 19 both of Milton were killed when their car collided with a truck on the Upper Base Line at the Ninth Line intersection. The diabetic, Philip Charlton, 25, had been missing since the last week in January. His frozen body was found in a ravine near Rattlesnake Lake by two armymen from Toronto.

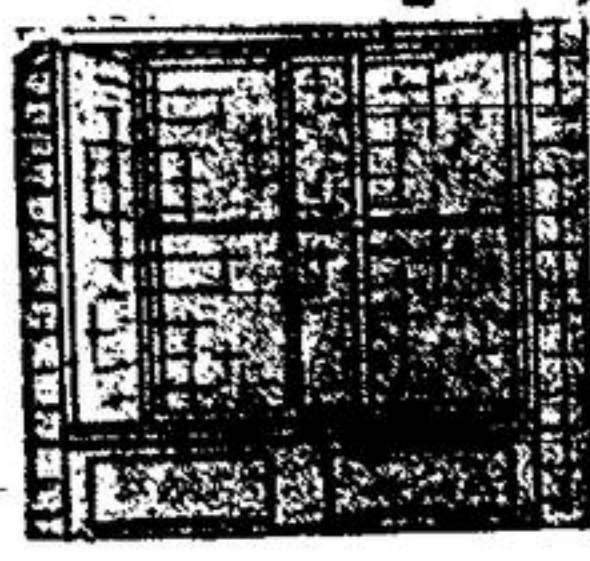
