with high quality homes? You'd get as much assessment as the hundred acres."
In reply to a question from Denney Charles, of the Committee of Adjustments, Clerk K.C. Lindsay stated there were one hundred and two lots sold in 1966. "Some of those were ten acre lots, which can be sold to their heart's content, since they are considered farms," remarked K.C. Lindsay.

Last year council passed a by-law upping the frontage of ten acre lots, or over, to a minimum of 570 feet, in an effort to avoid long narrow strips of land with a house on the front and weeds behind. It also cut down the number of separations that can be made from a parcel of land.

The Committee of Adjustments then suggested the minimum size of a lot could be increased from 15,000 square feet to 20,000 square feet, with the house requirements upped from 1,000 square feet to 1,200 square feet.
Mr. Currie pointed out that the Health Unit Sanitation Officer had expressed the opinion that a larger lot requirement might be advisable when it has to contain a well and a septic tank.

Cr. Tom Hill objected to the house size on the grounds that older people might want to sell off most of their farm and build themselves a small house, but he favoured the larger lots.

Cr. Pat Patterson claimed his taxes had risen from \$167 to \$437, with the increase of \$272 all education taxes. "The basic township rate was down 3/10 of a mill last year, and the rest is all school costs," he explained.

James McPhail of the Committee of Adjustments wondered what could be done about the lack of control of ten acre lots. "Should we not register an objection with Queen's Park," he asked. "We get no separation money and 9 1/2 acres of weeds."

Ed Harrop told him the County Planning Association hoped to make representation to Queen's Park on this subject.
Summing up, Reeve Leslie stated "it looks like we have two ideas, first we cut the number of separations from a hundred acre farm, from four to two, or we up the minimum size of a lot from 15,000 square feet to 20,000 square feet, with the house upped from 1,000 to 1,200 square feet."
They plan to meet on the 17th to settle the question.

Three Injured in Car Crash on No. 7 Hwy.

Two youths and a man were injured when cars collided on Guelph St. Thursday night.
Treated at Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital were Keith Peacock, 17, of 5 John St. W., Jack Kemshead, 15, of Glen Williams and Jack B. Collidge, 63, of 56 Main St. N.
Peacock suffered a bruised left arm and left side, Kemshead, a cut over his left eye and Coolidge, facial lacerations.

They were riding in a 1957 Chevrolet driven by Peacock which was in collision with a 1963 Rambler operated by Joseph Frank, 18 Victoria St.
Police said Frank was westbound on Guelph St. and making a left turn. Peacock was travelling east.
Georgetown police constable Harry Liberty investigated the crash shortly after 7:50 p.m. He placed damage at \$900.

MAY LOOK FOR MORE WATER

Drilling for an additional water well is being considered this year, Deputy Reeve Arthur Speight told council Monday.
"We're looking to the future and don't want to be caught like some of our neighbours with a water shortage," he said. Cost of the new well could be forty to fifty thousand dollars, he estimates.
Meanwhile council decided to debenture a water line extension from Todd Road to Martin Road to service the new Murray Motors building, as well as future industrial buildings in that district.
