Candidates Warming Up for Election in Halton East

Though there has been no announcement of a date for the next Provincial election, all three candidates have already started wooing the electorate of the new riding of Halton East (Georgetown, Esquesing, Milton and Oakville).

Progressive Conservative James Snow, echoing his Liberal and New Democratic opponents, said: "We don't know the exact date, but we expect Mr. Robart to call an election before the summer holidays."

Liberal candidate Robin Skuce said: "Although the old provincial Halton riding was strongly conservative the new riding of Halton East appears to be extremely marginal. It will be the campaign that will decide it."

Mr. Skuce, head of the French Department at Appley College, said his campaign will stress issues in education, particularly a more equitable tax base for education costs.

Other issues will be the record of the Conservative government, which he called "retroactive, acting only from crisis: pollution control; and the financial climate of investment in the province."
