On Saturday, April 8, the Current Events Club of Georgetown District High School defended the school's victory of last year at a Model U.N. Security Council held in Oakville.

The delegation of Zambia, comprised of Richard Enright, Andy Spiege, Mark Irwin, John Riley, Bob Barber and Rick Landry took home the best delegation honours.

Australia, represented by Robert Saxe, Lesley Buresh, Tony McAuley, Alex Goudekelling, and Doug Stephens, came third.

Ten schools and about fifty-five students participated in this Model Security Council, and among the issues on the agenda were Vietnam, admission to the U.N. of Red China, Rhodesia, the Israel-Syria conflict, and South West African problems.

The judges were very impressed with the high quality of debate and the knowledge the students had of the countries represented. Debate was often heated, but Roger Smith, who was the President of the Council, kept strict order and made known threats to eject certain over-vociferous delegates. Roger, incidentally was runner-up in the best individual category, and the judges pointed out that he was not given an award simply because he was not technically a delegate.

Nevertheless, Georgetown emerged with flying colours. Now, in addition to two U.N. victories last year, the students add the Security Council Plaque to their long list of successes. The students brought high honours to themselves, their school, and their community.

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## TURNUED DOWN ON SEWER CLAIM WILL SUE TOWN

The mayor commending a ratepayer for taking action against the town was an unusual occurrence at council, Monday night.

Hugh Wylie, John Street, challenged council to show why his claim was unjust. "Seven members seem to think my claim isn't a just one," said Mr. Wylie, referring to the resolution to pay him \$100, defeated last week.

The mayor explained that the town pays premiums to insurance companies to cover liability, and feared setting the precedent of paying town money to individuals when town money is supposed to protect the ratepayer by insurance.

"I understand you have taken action against the town," added the mayor, "It's a good idea perhaps we'll know now where the responsibility lies".

Agreeing with the mayor, Reeve Hunter stated he didn't understand why Mr. Wylie should have to spend his own money to prove where the responsibility lies. "The adjustors never even went to see him," he added.

The Reeve pointed out that the town carries insurance the same as private individuals do on their car, not to get out of anything but simply to protect themselves.

Deputy Reeve Art Spight suggested a fifty or hundred dollar deductible type insurance for the town. "Regardless of the outcome of this case I am going to ask the insurance company for a review of all damage claims."

"We come home and never know if sewage is going to be in the cellar," commented Mr. Wylie.

The mayor recalled lots of discussion over claims and stated it might be to the town's advantage to have the action proceed against the town. He went so far as to wonder if it might be wise for the town to assume the cost of the action.

A letter from Dodokin and Sopinka later in the evening informed council that unless Mr. Wylie received the \$96.19 claim, they would proceed with legal action.
