## Nick Ferri Serves Halton As Produce Marketing Rep.

Local greenhouse vegetable producers recently elected Nick Ferri of Norval and Bob Voorberg of Kettleby, to act as their representatives to the Local Board of the new Greenhouse Vegetable Producers' Marketing Plan. These two men will represent the counties of Halton, Peel, York, Ontario, Simcoe and Durham, in this province-wide marketing organization.

The main function of the marketing plan at the present time will be to establish minimum prices for the crop. No person will be allowed to sell below this price, hence some market stability should result. Fees will be collected from all producers on a volume basis. These monies will be used to operate the plan.

A district committee of five members was elected as well. Members will be as follows: — Bill Rupka, Burlington; John Vandemarel, Hornby; Ron Kingshott, Norval; Peter Van Tuyl, Port Credit; Leon Rader, Brantford. These persons will handle local problems of the marketing plan, and will act as the voice of the growers in reporting to the Board.

## Would Rebate Sales Tax After Home is Purchased

George Kerr, Progressive Conservative MPP from Halton, asked Stanley Randall, minister of economics and development, in the legislature Tuesday why the provincial sales tax on homes couldn't be rebated to the builder or purchaser after a home was completed.

Mr. Randall said he would like to see the provincial and federal sales tax on building materials removed. However he said he has not recommended that the provincial tax be removed because this would lead to similar demands from other industries.

He said the Ontario government is negotiating for 4,233 building lots to help ease the housing shortage in Metropolitan Toronto.

Because of high land costs in Metro, the lots would be used for multiple family or condominium type dwellings, he told the legislature. Nine of the lots assembled and serviced under the government's home ownership made easy — HOME plan — would be leased or sold for the single family homes.

No lots have been purchased since the HOME plan was announced in January. At that time, the government had 6,000 lots throughout Ontario, purchased at a total cost of \$6,000,000.

In spite of a few sudden, mad, final bursts of winter, spring does seem to promise that the warm weather of summer is really on its way.
