Mr. Moss predicted the club's green at the corner of Edith and William streets will be ready for play by May 24. Conditioning has already started including some seeding.

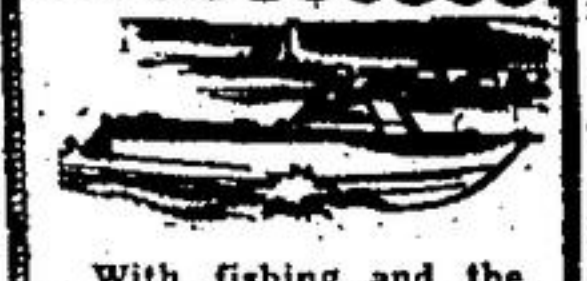

Campbellville Merchants will again play almost all of their home games on Sunday afternoon. Preston Pirates, Waterdown IGA's and Milton Red Sox all asked for some Sunday home dates.

Second busiest night of the week will be Wednesday, Georgetown Giants, Hamilton Beavers, Oakville and Waterdown will all play home games on that night.

Only night the league will be completely idle will be Friday. Milton will be at home Monday, Burlington Cardinals Tuesday, Dundas Thursday and Preston Saturday.

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Oil That Reel, Anglers Trout Season Opens Sat.

Untangle that line and get that bait box organized, trout season opens Saturday.
Brook, brown, and rainbow trout runs from April 29th to September 13th this year.

Limits on rainbow and brown are five in one day, and on brook trout, ten pounds plus one fish or fifteen fish, whichever is lesser.

Other open seasons for angling in this district:
Pike — May 13 to March 31 in all inland waters.
Walleye — May 13 to March 13.

Lake Trout and Splake — January 1 to October 10.
Maskinonge — June 17th to November 30th.

Largemouth and Smallmouth Bass — June 24th to Nov. 30th

Limits of Catch (Possession limit not to exceed one day's legal limit)
Pike, Walleye and Bass — Six of each in one day.

Lake Trout and Splake — From inland waters, three in one day. From Great Lakes, 3 in one day.

Even Illegal Dragsters Like to Be Organized

North Halton's well-paved back roads often lined with trees and sparsely populated, have for some time been ideal spots for lining up two or three 'hot' cars and deciding who is really fastest.

Authorities, however, take a dim view of quarter-mile tests on public roads, and the races are held for only a few minutes at a time so noise and speed won't attract prowling cruisers.

Something of a more permanent nature has developed on the Seventh Line of Equestrian, tho' About a mile north of the Base line on this road, some dragster with a sense of organization measured off a one-quarter mile stretch of road with good visibility. At the southern end, he has painted in broad yellow letters, a line running from shoulder to shoulder and two
