**County Women's Institute
Take Farm Accident Survey**

How many farm accidents will occur in Halton County during the coming year? A Halton Farm Accident Survey will again be conducted by the Halton County Women's Institute.

In the original accident survey in 1959, there were a total of 111 accidents in the county resulting in 6 fatalities. Accident victims lost 1,500 hours of work, with medical bills of \$15,000 and property damage \$191,000.

Has our accident rate improved during the years? This survey is to indicate any changes and to provide useful information to assist in the prevention of accidents. Workmen's Compensation is now compulsory for farm employees. There is an indication that farm rates may increase if the current farm accident rate continues.

Mrs. W. Webb, Campbellville No. 1, president of the Halton Women's Institute was chairman of a special meeting for the 29 W.I. reporters in the Agricultural Office, Milton on Monday, April 10th. The reporters will collect information on each accident occurring to a farm family which results in 2 or more hours of time lost or over \$25 in property damage. The survey is to run from April 1, 1967 to March 31, 1968.

**Up to \$2,500 in
Capital Grants available
to Ontario Farmers**

The Government of Ontario has increased its Capital Grants program by \$129,000,000 effective April 1, 1967, and continuing through 1979. Farmers can apply for the following Capital Grants:

First
You can get up to \$1,000 based on one third of the cost of:
Erection or renovation of farm buildings — paving barn yards — liquid manure storage tanks — grading, packing and storage buildings — greenhouses — silos — grain storage and milk houses, or a combination of these.

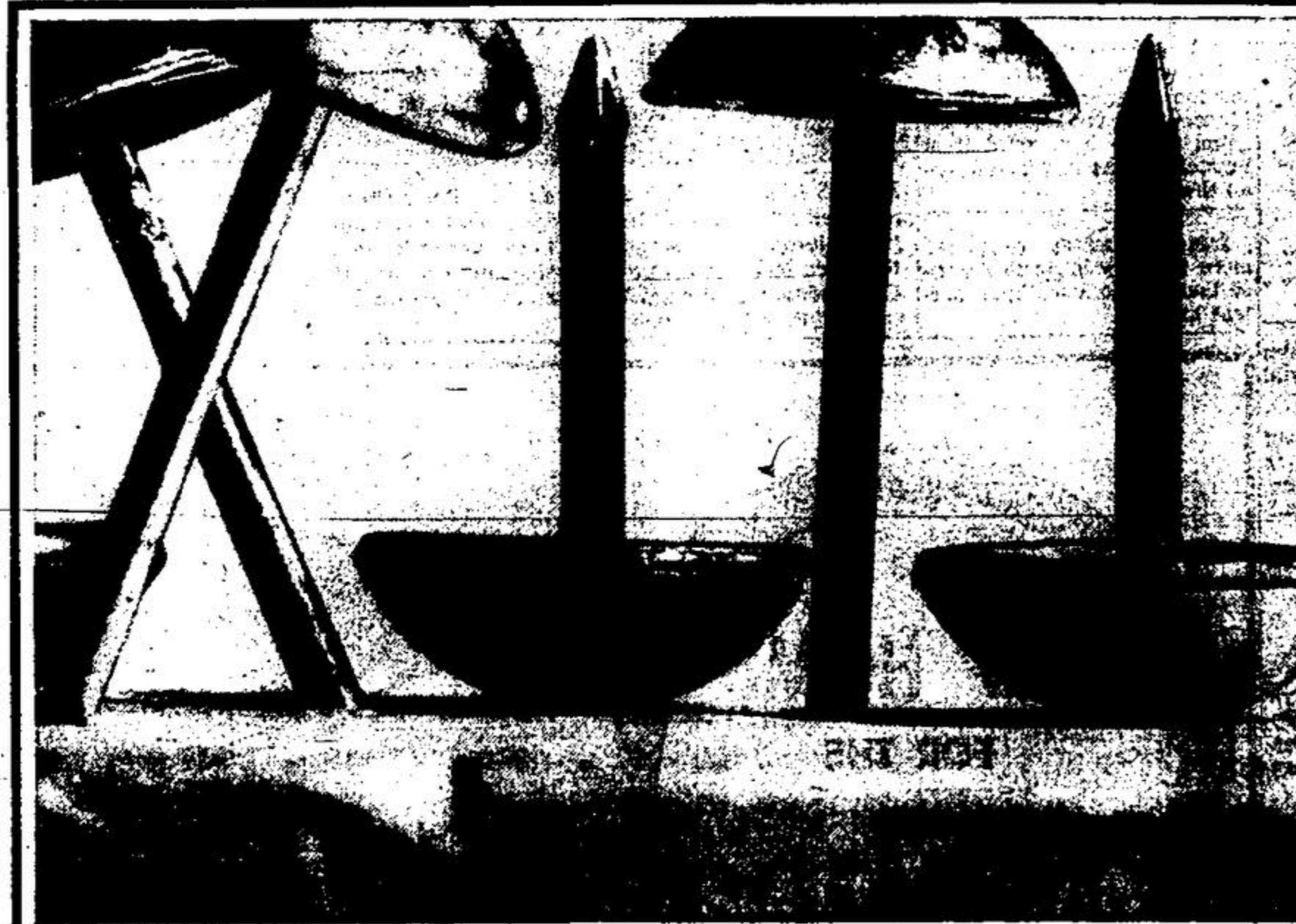
Second
Fifty per cent of the cost of a drilled, bored or dug well, or for the development of a special source of water, up to \$500 under the ARDA program.

Also
Under ARDA these Capital Grants continue to be available. Forty per cent of the cost of field enlargement up to \$500. Fifty per cent of the cost of digging a farm pond up to \$600.
