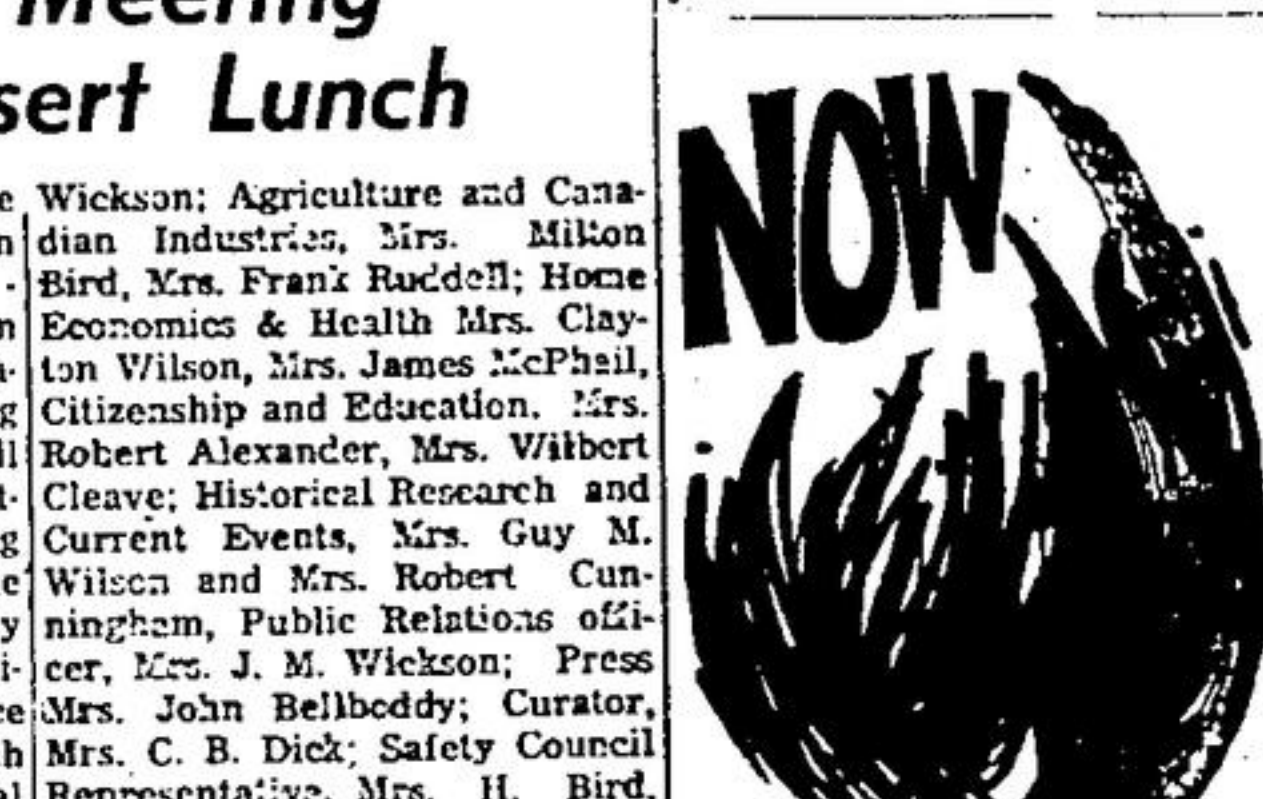
Discuss Revisions for Barbershops By-Law

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LET'S PLAY BRIDGE

The ability to get from one hand to another as declarer is important. Cards not only serve as tricks and stoppers, but also serve as entries. Sometimes when entries are short, you may have to call upon the opponents to help you out.

Here is a hand where the opposition could not stop declarer from doing what he wanted to do.

South are vulnerable.

The bidding:

South	West	North	East
1 NT	Pass	2 NT	Pass

The bidding requires only 1 trump on 12-14 points. This explains South's opening bid. Although there are only 25 points between North and South, three no trump has a much better chance with 14 points opposite 11, than with, say, 18 pts. opposite seven.

West leads the heart five, which is won by declarer's nine. Declarer leads a spade and finds West with a void. East wins the spade queen with the king and leads last heart. West wins and plays it safe by exiting with a heart. Declarer discards a low diamond from dummy, while East lets go of a spade.

Declarer is very anxious to get to dummy, to lead a spade. There is a sure entry in clubs but this will cost a trick. So declarer must do what he can. The queen of clubs is led, but East does not take the trick. A low club is led and the jack is played in dummy.
