

High School Budget \$861,980 \$227,279 From Town Taxpayers

Georgetown taxpayers will supply \$277,279 and Esqueping Township taxpayers \$90,408 to the Georgetown District High School's operation in 1967. The school's budget was recently struck at \$861,980, \$346,737 of which will come from town and township taxes.

Grants will account for \$476,000, and the balance will come from fees from other boards, and night school fees etc. The 1966 surplus was \$11,943.

Of the money to be raised through taxes, Georgetown supplies approximately 80 per cent, and Esqueping approximately 20 per cent.

The total budget is an increase of \$114,356 over 1966.

Day School Instruction, the largest single category requires \$404,291. It includes \$403,969 in salaries for principals and teachers, \$32,452 for secretarial staff, \$4,280 for supply teachers, \$1,000 for orientation and home instruction, and \$10,000 labelled possible increase.

After a workshop meeting, the ladies had gone to see the Centennial flame and the Parliament buildings, but were too late to get into the buildings. While admiring the beauty of the grounds Dr. Reinhardt, M.P. for Orillia and his wife and J.R. Tucker, a Newfoundland M.P. left the Commons and asked if they could help in any way.

Mr. Tucker that night directed them to one of the special galleries and they watched a lively session on unification of the armed forces. Defence Minister Paul Hellyer was debating and Halton M.P. Dr. Harry Harley was there, although they did not have a chance to meet him.

One of the pages brought a message from Mr. Tucker to stay until after the business was ended. He showed them around the building, pointing out where the tragic incident took place in which a man killed himself with a bomb, the beautiful wood carved library and other features of the building. They chatted with Mr. Tucker over doughnuts and coffee and got the impression that he is a dedicated politician who loves his work people and the Parliament buildings.

The ladies had a bus tour through the capital, seeing many embassies, and gardens blooming with crocuses.

Georgetown Public Schools Will Cost \$906,298 to Operate in '67

The Georgetown Public School Board has adopted a budget for 1967 totalling \$906,298, an increase of \$183,868 over the 1966 figure. Two-thirds of it, \$604,568 will go for salaries.

Grants will take care of approximately \$517,000. There was a cash balance from 1966 of \$38,357 leaving \$333,705 to be raised through municipal taxes.

Joan Beatty of Milton, a Harrison pupil, came first in both the Special Centennial Classes Solo by Canadian composer and solo open class 30 and under. Her success in these classes entitles Joan to compete in the provincial finals in Waterloo later this month.

Gold medal winners were Robert Rudy and George Mills in Boys Duet under 13; Joan Beatty in Soprano, Concert

songs; Lois Elliott and Linda Rea in Girl's Duet under 13; David Farnell in Baritone solo under 18; Sandra Greig in Mezzo Soprano, Concert Song; Sandra Greig in Mezzo Soprano, Oratorio; Lois Elliott in Girl's solo under 14; Milree Armstrong and Bill Brush in Mixed Duet.

Joan Beatty won a silver medal in soprano solo class, and Lois Elliott a bronze medal in Girl's solo under 13.


