Over 36 years, Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Benton have sold the business to a Georgetown Co. Mr. and Mrs. Aurel Bourque 31 Raylawn Cres.

The Bques, who will be living in a residence of which the store part, moved in on Saturday. The Bentons will be staying temporarily with their son Bert and his wife on their farm near the village.

Mr. Benton had storekeeping in 1931 up to another building, being in present one four 1/2 later. His father, the late Frank Benton, was appointed postmaster in 1935 and after his death in 1943 Mrs. Benton was appointed to this post.

Mr. Benton, who has been assessment commissioner for Essex Township since 1935, has spent most of his life in the village. His wife, the former Isabel Neilson was a school teacher before her marriage. Student Will Earn Cash As Summertime Soldiers

Students have responded enthusiastically to an advertisement in The Herald for a student militia six week summer course, with over twenty-five answering the first call.

The course sponsored by the Lorne Scots regiment, is designed primarily for the students, held in the summer when they are free of study. In this course the trainees stay at home, but are picked up by truck each morning and taken to Brampton, where they study First Aid, field craft, tactics, various infantry weapons, and lots of drill.

Frequently they go on field trips where they eat army rations.

They are subject to army discipline, and are treated as men not boys. One of the major benefits, according to the sponsors, is the cutting of the mother's apron strings, and the teaching of responsibility. They have to get up early and be there when the truck arrives at the pickup point.

Some, not many, do drop out, when they find the going tougher than they expected, but most enjoy the comradeship and team work necessary in many of the projects.

The boys earn \$250 for their six week effort, and finish the course with a "passing out" parade, which usually astonishes the parents with the transition from awkward youth to well drilled soldier.

The course has been offered by the Lorne Scots for the past twelve years. This year, as last, Major A. Goodwin of Brampton is the officer in charge of the course.

Fringe benefits for the parents, at least, are seeing their sons press pants, shine shoes.
