For Mother's Day....

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LET'S PLAY BRIDGE

To play an ace on your partner's queen would seem to be a waste of high cards, especially if declarer did not play the king. Yet such a play is needed occasionally to set a contract.

Against no trump contracts the normal lead is the fourth best of your longest and strongest suit.

This rule is changed when your longest suit is headed by a sequence. Then your best lead is the top of the sequence. So if your partner leads an honor against a no trump contract, he is leading the top of a sequence and it is your job to get out of the road — to emblock.

Here is a hand from last week's game at the Acton Bridge Club. The dealer is South and East-West are vulnerable.

The bidding:
South West North East
1NT Pass 3NT All Pass
The bidding is quite brief and exact as a bidding sequence should be with balanced hands. Perhaps you wonder about North's raise to three no trump on only nine points. The two tens and the sequence that North holds promotes this holding to ten points. West's longest and strongest suit is spades. Since spades are headed by a sequence, the correct lead is top of the sequence, that is the queen. West would look very foolish

Robert W. Linham Farmed in District

Robert William Linham, 78, retired district farmer, died at his home RR 1, Limehouse on Thursday. He was 87.
