

\$544,000 For Building Permits "Biggest Total We've Ever Had"

Building permits totalling \$544,000 were issued for the Township of Esquesing during the months of March and April. It was disclosed at Esquesing council Monday evening.

Reeve George Leslie said the total was "the biggest one we have ever had," over a two month period.

Big item on the list of building permits shown to council by building inspector Tom McLean was for a \$250,000 office and garage for McKinley Transport on Highway 25 north of 401 just above Milton.

Councillors Patterson and Goodlet questioned the award of 80 per cent of building permit fees to the inspector and were informed it was set by by-law for services. Mr. Patterson also enquired how much inspection was necessary for

buildings with an architect and specifications. Permit fees amounted to \$601 of which the building inspector is entitled to \$552.80.

Most of the permits were for new residences, additions or alterations.

GVAS Called On Sixteen Times

Emergency runs outnumbered routine transportations on the Georgetown Volunteer Ambulance Services April record book. The GVAS vehicles made 16 runs during the month, nine of them emergencies.

Eleven trips were to Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital, the rest to Toronto General, Peel Memorial and Guelph General.

ESQUESING TOWNSHIP COUNCIL BRIEFS

Esquesing Council at their regular meeting Monday:

• Endorsed two resolutions from the town of Orangeville regarding education in the province. The first requested the provincial government to set up a uniform teachers' salary schedule for municipalities across the province and the second asked approved plans be made available for the building of schools anywhere in the province.

• Appointed Councillor Tom Hill to represent the township at a meeting of the North Halton Urban Board Wednesday, May 10 in Georgetown.

• Authorized a refund of \$19.00 to George Ware for a building permit. Mr. Ware has decided not to build on his lot in the township.

• Read three times and passed a controversial by-law setting the minimum lot size at 20,000 square feet in the township on a recorded vote. Minimum lot size was restricted to a frontage of 125 feet and a depth of 160 feet. Voting in favor were Councillors Goodlet and Patterson with Currie and Hill against. Reeve Leslie's vote for the affirmative broke the tie.

• Authorized payment of the road superintendent's account of \$10,892.81.

• Gave permission to the Glen Williams minor ball club to hold a tag day in May 13.

• Granted permission for a centennial street dance in Norval on June 24, proceeds to go to the boy scouts and girl guides.

• Approved the budget for Acton Fire Area No. 2 Esquesing's share of the cost will be 40 per cent including \$1,959.80 for equipment and dress uniforms for Acton firefighters.



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Find Barn Blaze Caused By Rubbish

Fire which destroyed a shed and spread to the two barns near Hornby was caused by burning rubbish, according to a press release issued Tuesday by deputy fire chief Don Cherrington.

Persons with a right to be on the property were burning garbage between 10 a.m. and 3 p.m. on April 30, the release says. The bonfire, only 40 or 50 feet from a shed, was still smoldering when they left. At 4:30 p.m., fire reached the shed and spread to the two barns. A neighbouring farmer, Jim Hamilton, of Hornby, thought the body of Marjanne Schuett, 10, missing from her Kilbride home for a week, might have been in one of the burning barns.

Bill Adcock, Mary Ellen Stockley Named Best High School Cadets

At the annual High School Cadet Corps inspection in the park last Wednesday night, Cadet Major Bill Adcock was awarded the Col. Barber trophy as Best Cadet; Cadet Mary Ellen Stockley as Best Girl Cadet. Cadet Major Bill Adcock is also company commander of the cadets.

Following a march past and saluting of the colours with Captain Frank Ching taking the salute, Cadet Lt. John Graff headed a fighting patrol demonstration, which won the J. L. Lambert Trophy for the best demonstration of the night.

Under the direction of Cadet Lt. Randy Hibbert, a weapon stripping demonstration, in which a Bren gun is stripped and reassembled, was shown by Lt. Pedwell and Glen Window.

They also stripped and reassembled their rifles with their eyes closed. Tom Hutchison and Glen Window then demonstrated a rocket launcher.

Lowering a victim lashed to a stretcher from the armoury balcony to the floor illustrated a national survival technique. Cadet Lt. Dennis Stief supervised the operation.

Under Sgt. Major Steve Ewing, a twelve man precision squad demonstrated various drills.

Prior to the presentation of awards the Lorne Scots Pipe and Drum Corps shook the hall with a few march numbers.

In addition to the best cadet and best girl cadet won by Major Bill Adcock and Sgt. Mary Ellen Stockley, respectively, the general proficiency award went to Corporal Glen Window and the best first year cadet award to Alan Garbutt.

Assisting in handing out the awards was Chief Instructor Archie Roberts, while Lt. Fred Roberts was in charge of programming.

Parents' Help Will Keep Nursery School Cost Low

The YMCA plans a non-profit cooperative type nursery school with the parents helping in order to keep the costs down. At first it would probably operate only half a day.

The location has not been established yet but church basements or Ceddarvale are being considered. When this is settled the call will go out for toys, books and children's furniture.

A similar project sponsored by the "Y" is in operation in Sault Ste. Marie.

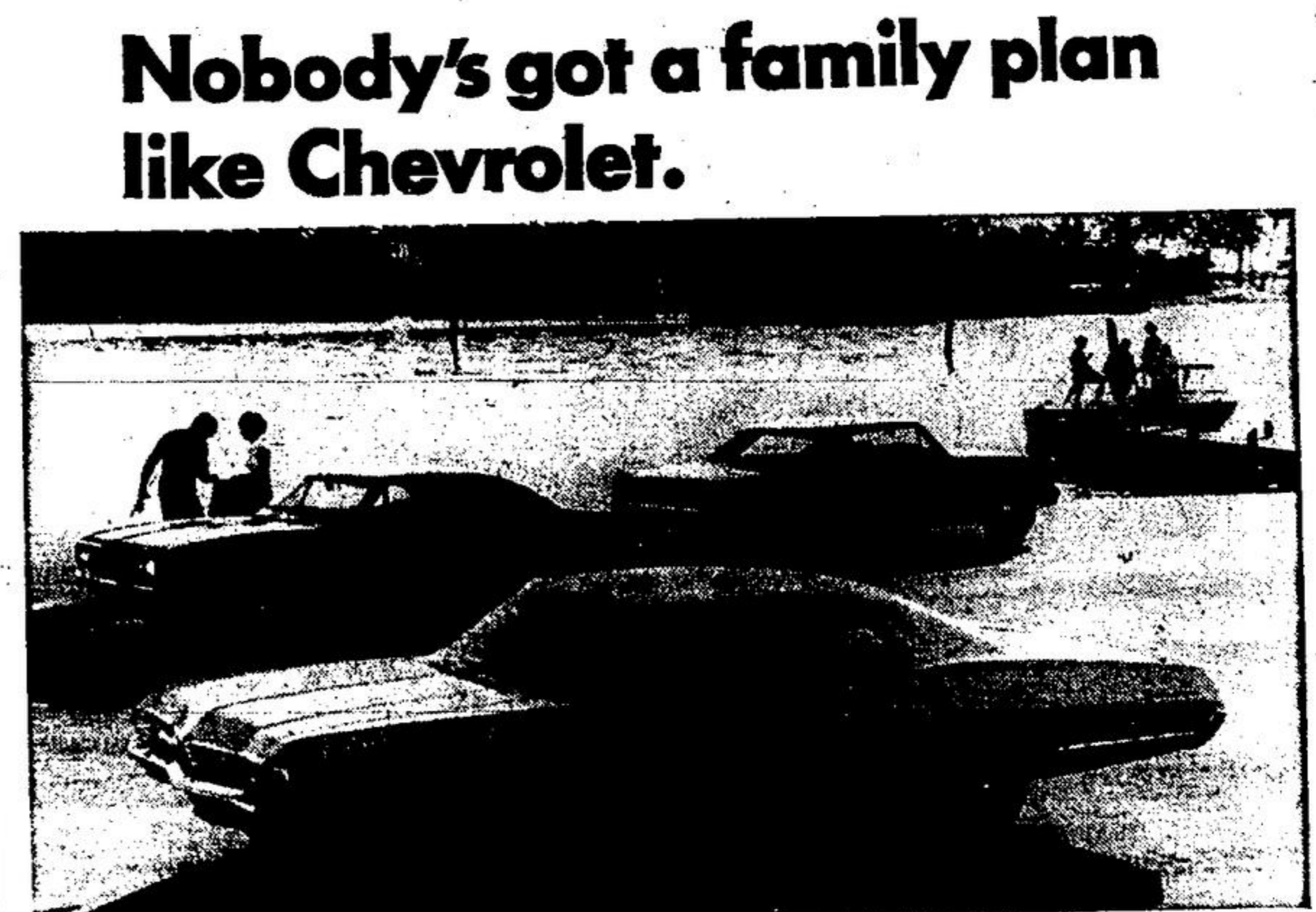
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
