

New Residents Delegation Scores Speeding, Sidewalks, Potholes

Acting as spokesman for a delegation of twelve new residents, Hugh Powell, Duncan Drive, labelled his street "Duncan Drive drag strip" for council Monday night.

He asked for the police radar unit on the street, and pointed out that he had made the same request seven years ago when he was a new resident. "At that time we saw the police radar for two days and never saw them again."

Mr. Powell told of repeated phone calls to council and Skopit Homes regarding the completion of sidewalks. "The subdividers says it's the town's responsibility and the town says it's the subdividers' he remarked.

He, then deplored the condi-

tions of the roads in the Mountainview-Sinclair-Duncan area, claiming there were potholes big enough "to lose a car".

Conceding that Mr. Powell's "beefs" were legitimate, Cr. Smith stated council is well aware of the situation. He emphasized the sidewalks are Skopit's responsibility, and should be completed within six weeks. "Skopit has given a definite commitment that they will be done in six weeks," he added.

Cr. Smith admitted the road at that three way intersection had always been a problem, explaining there was a clay base,

which had been dug up and gravel filled in part every year.

The road chairman said council intended to start a permanent road programme this year beginning with ten streets, which would cost \$150,000.

Mr. Powell suggested a fifteen mile an hour speed limit, since it was a road leading directly to a school.

A motion was passed asking Skopit Homes to expedite the sidewalks on Duncan Drive, and a letter written to all the builders in town asking them to attend a committee meeting next week.

Georgetown To Brantford Groups Get New Ministers
