

## Dump, Fires, Papers Bring Criticism Esqueusing Council Sends Member To Urban Board

The profusion of paper along the fourth line and fires in the township dump were criticized by councillors at the regular meeting of Esqueusing council.

Councillor Tom Hill said trucks were dumping paper in the wrong place and it was blowing all over. He asked there be more strict supervision of dumping.

Reeve George Leslie felt much of the rubbish along the fourth line came off trucks on their way to the dump, rather than from the dump. The dump can be clean and level as a floor Wednesday but by Saturday there'll be piles of rubbish and the lip will be full up, he said.

The agreement with the dump supervisor which gave him sole permission to remove scrap providing he looked after papers was reviewed and no decision was reached.

Confusion about the number of fires at the dump recently was shared by clerk K.C. Lindsay and the reeve. The clerk knew of only one while the reeve was sure there were two.

Councillors Patterson and

Hill, representatives of a meeting of Acton Fire Area 2 were impressed by Acton Firefighters.

"They showed us why new reels and equipment were necessary and were courteous and helpful in every way," said Councillor Hill.

Council passed the Fire Area budget on the strength of the delegation's endorsement and heard a request from one delegate that meetings of the Fire

Area be more frequent.

A letter from North Halton Urban Board secretary Jack McGeachie asking Esqueusing representatives to attend the next meeting on May 10 in Georgetown triggered discussion about the advisability of joining.

"What's the meeting about," asked Councillor Jim Goodlot. "Just what they said," retorted the reeve — "welfare and garbage."

Some councillors thought Esqueusing would not benefit because it was an urban board and the township is rural. Others could see similar problems being faced in all municipalities and thought some representation was necessary.

Tom Hill was delegated to go to the next meeting and bring back a report.

All councillors attended the two hour session with Reeve Leslie presiding.

## Issue Stop Work Order Council, Builders Meet

A resident of Rosefield Drive, Ron Snow, complained to council, on Monday, about the mud left on the roads by trucks en-

gaged in building further along Rosefield.

He also questioned the grade levels of the roads, saying his driveway was so high he could not get his car in.

Cr. Ballentine remarked that he had just been looking at

that area and that one only solution was elevators to get the cars up to the driveways.

Cr. Smith promised this too, would be discussed when the committee meeting with all the builders in attendance is held on Thursday night.

In the meantime the engineer was instructed to issue a 'stop work' order on all new homes till he verified they complied with regulations.

## Rustlers At Work Near Georgetown, Says O.P.P.

Two Hereford streets were rustled from the farm of Fred Russell, RR 3, Georgetown, and Esqueusing Twp. summer cottage was broken into and an antique clock taken, a car was stolen from an Esqueusing residence, and a 15' home made boat was found abandoned in one of the busiest weeks put in by North Halton O.P.P. April 30 to May 6.

Other occurrences included the attempted theft of a car at Campbellville, two stolen cars recovered by other police departments, theft of a 4-speed transmission from a car, an assault causing bodily harm resulting in one person being charged, an impaired driver, a Liquor Control Act investigation resulting in one charge, a charge under the Game and Fish Act, and a driver charged for driving while license sus-

ended. Other occurrences were of a minor nature.

Several officers of the detachment were also detailed to full-time duty in the search for Marianne Schuett, still missing from her Kilbride home.

As a result of patrol 5 traffic charges were preferred, 10 traffic violation warnings were issued, 18 vehicles were safely checked, and 81 convictions registered. There were 3 personal injury accidents and 1 property damage accident investigated, resulting in 6 persons being injured and approximately \$4,040 in property damage. Causes of accidents were — inattentive driving, careless driving and following too close.

## People In Glass Houses Inspecting The Flowers

In spite of the rainy weather 300 guests attended the first Open House of the Hornby Greenhouses on Sunday, May 7. Guests were received by Mr. and Mrs. Andy Trischler, Mr. and Mrs. Henry Nowak and Mr. Steve Tréncs. Doughnuts, cookies and coffee were served by Hedi Nowak.

Ninety thousand square feet under glass was open for inspection through guided tours led by foreman Fred Maunten-dorfer, Adam Barth, Ulrich Kay, and Urkhard Nowak. Visitors saw and learned what it takes to make their famous flowers grow.

There are twenty-one greenhouses and each one is heated by oil burners. In an ordinary week three thousand gallons of crude oil are used. Water and fertilizer is supplied to the flowers by machines which water two beds at once.

In winter the days are prolonged by electric lighting. The people were greatly amazed by the variety of mums. To show what can be done with flowers, several arrangements were on display made by Mr. Henry Nowak. Box plants for spring planting of a wide variety were also shown. Flower orders are delivered in Toronto, Peterborough and the Quebec province.

There are twenty people on the staff. Each lady was presented with a small green plant on her departure.
