Central Incinerator Possible Remedy for Garbage Headache

A centrally located \$280,000 incinerator serving the five municipalities of Acton, Milton, Georgetown, Esquesing and Nassagaweya, was one of the solutions to garbage disposal offered at last week's North Halton urban board meeting, devoted exclusively to the subject.

The Alling Urban Board received considerably when thirteen members of the various councils turned up. For the first time, the rural municipalities were represented with Cr. Tom Hill attending from Esquesing and Deputy-Reeve W. Hoey and Cr. Ross Gordon of Nassagaweya.

The suggestion of a central incinerator perhaps around Speyside, was made following a film shown by Plibrico Canada Ltd., makers of incinerators.

The film showed incinerators in towns ranging from 1,500 to 17,000 population, in Sweden, Italy, United States and Canada installed and designed by Plibrico.

John Baron of Plibrico explained that the stoker is made in Galt, so parts are available easily. The incinerators conform to the Air Pollution standard.

HIGH SCHOOL DROPS CADETS

At a Georgetown District High School Board meeting Monday, a resolution made it officially effective June, 1967.
