THERE'S A SPAN OF FIFTY YEARS between the nurse's uniforms being worn by Mrs. Audrey Martin, and Mrs. Mae Sacco. For a ceremony at which thirteen 'Care in the Home' students graduated recently Mrs. Martin wore a British Red Cross Voluntary Air Detachment uniform worn by her mother, the late Mrs. Blanche Grieve 50 years ago. Mrs. Sacco's uniform is that of the graduate 'Care in the Home' nurses.

Wilfred John Swift Resident 8 Months

A member of the Royal Canadian Navy from 1944 to 1946, Wilfred John (Jack) Swift, died in Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital on May the 5th at the age of 43. Born in Stouffville, the son of Thomas Arthur Swift and Hazel Eva Dehaney he lived there until 1940 attending public and high schools.

Residing in Toronto from 1940 where he married his wife Dorothy in 1943, until 1960 when they moved to Brampton and thence to Georgetown in August of 1966. At the time of his death he was a member of the staff of Orenda Engines. He was affiliated with the Technical Associates Lodge 1922 (International Association of Machinists) and a member of the Brampton Canadian Legion.

He is survived by his wife, a daughter Bonnie (Mrs. R. Earle), a son Robert, his mother Mrs. T.A. Swift, of Toronto, a brother George of Toronto and two sisters, Joyce (Mrs. J. Thuro) Don Mills, and Edith (Mrs. W. Sanders) Stouffville; and one grandson, Christopher John Earle.

Rev. R. Scrivens of St. John's United Church conducted the funeral service at the Harold C. McClure Funeral Home, 34 Edith Street, on May 8th. Pallbearers were Reg Simpson, Caldon; James DeSylva, Norval; James Holden, Brampton; John Thuro, Don Mills; Cliff Woodcock, Markham; William Sanders, Stouffville. Interment was in York Cemetery, Toronto.

LET'S PLAY BRIDGE

How many times have you held a hand with lots of high cards, only to find the opponents with the final contract. So you double and they make the contract.

It is often easier to defeat a hand if the defensive strength is more evenly divided. This is a hand that occurred at the Acton Bridge Club.

Declarer Bill Wandel of Acton took advantage of two defensive errors to bring home the contract. Dealer is South; neither side vulnerable.

North
S-10 6 3
H-Q 9 4 2
D-J 9
C-J 9 6 3

West East
S-K J 9 5 2 S-7

The bidding:
South West North East
1S Dble Pass 2D
2S Dble Pass Pass
3NT Dble All Pass

West's first double is a take-out double. When East bid two diamonds, South did not wish to give up and rebid a four-card spade suit. Normally, West will not hold spades on a takeout double of spades, but this time he did and he doubled for penalty. South tried two trump and was doubled again.

There were two defensive errors and they are opposite in nature. Both involve aces — but let's see what happened.

West led the diamond king and followed this with the ten which east won. East tried a low club, ducked a declarer, and won by West. West led a third diamond and South won. Two high clubs were cashed.
