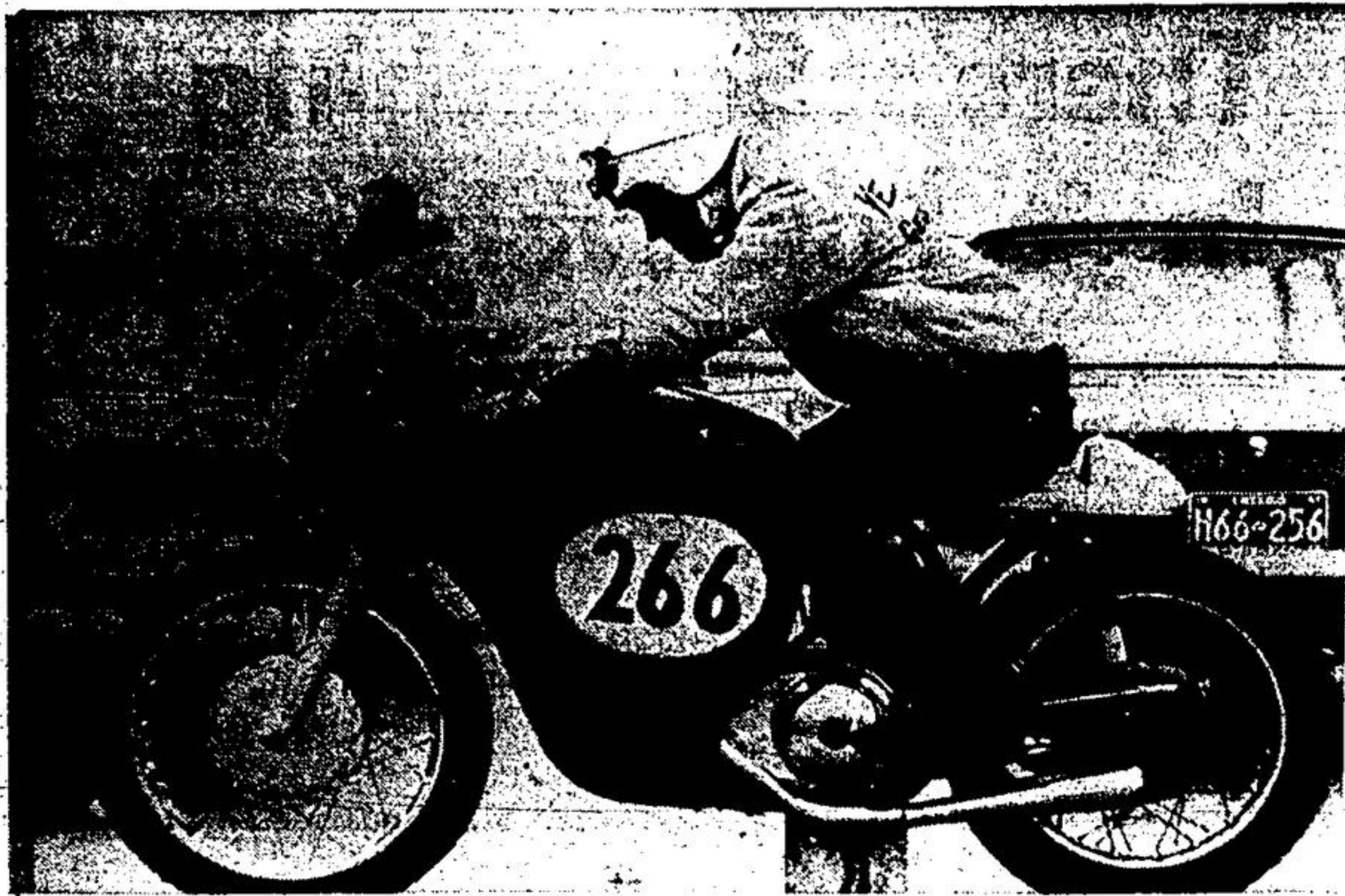


SET FOR MONDAY'S TITLE RACE

Ambulance Stands by While Work Force Goes Underground

The combined efforts of the works department, the fire department, and the ambulance corps made a potentially dangerous job a safe and efficient one, deputy reeve Art Speight told council Monday night.

The job was the cleaning of the underground water tank, where chlorine gasses could accumulate. The fire department installed large exhaust fans to draw out any chlorine gas, and the town engineer and fogsman inspected it before allowing the town works men to go into the drained tank to clean it. They

used fire department hoses. The ambulance corps stood by in case of any emergency.

Cr. Fred Harrison pointed out to mayor Gibbons, long an opponent of the water tower, that the eight-hour shut down would have been impossible without the water tower, now in operation.

While on the subject of water, council passed a motion to engage Rutledge Water Wells Ltd., to conduct a pumping test on existing wells, at a cost of \$738 the quotation price.

Water chairman Art Speight claimed the tests would show the town the amount of water they have to depend on.

The mayor felt other areas rather than the existing wells should be tested, suggesting another well in that area might weaken the present supply.

Deputy Reeve Art Speight claimed the aquifer tests would show whether existing supplies would be weakened. He stated the hole was already bored and it would be a simple matter of cleaning it out. "If this test shows we have an ample supply for two or three years, we won't have to go the great expense

of further exploration for some time."

"We joined the Credit Valley Conservation authority," said Cr. Fred Harrison, "believing they planned to build a dam which would have charged all the wells in that area. The town has already spent a hundred thousand dollars on Conservation, which has gone into recreation for the city of Toronto rather than conservation," he concluded.

"For a matter of two thousand dollars, including the hydrology consultants fee for aquifer tests and the evaluation of existing wells, we can find out where we stand, rather than spend forty or fifty thousand dollars for explorations," added deputy reeve Speight.

The motion to engage Hydrology Consultants at a cost not to exceed six hundred dollars, and the motion to engage Rutledge Water Wells Ltd. at \$738, passed unanimously.

Kenneth MacDonald Was Town Councillor

Kenneth Ray MacDonald, a resident of Georgetown all his life, died at the age of 76 on May 8th in Georgetown & District Memorial Hospital. He was the son of Ellen Maw and William MacDonald and received his education in Georgetown.

For twenty five years he was an employee of the Creelman Knitting Company but from 1930 he was self employed in the knitting business until the beginning of this year when he retired.

Mr. and Mrs. MacDonald (the former Margaret Anthony) were married in Georgetown and celebrated their Golden Wedding Anniversary in June 1954. He was active in civic affairs and at the time of his death was a member of the Cemetery Board and the Royal Canadian Legion. He had served as councillor, deputy-reeve and reeve of Georgetown for a number of years and had also been a member of County Council. He was with the Lorne Scouts Brass Band from its beginning until about twelve years ago.

Surviving are his wife, and daughters Helen and Jessie, at home, Olive (Mrs. J.L. Jones) Toronto and one brother William of Georgetown and two grandchildren, Gary and Denise. Two brothers predeceased him many years ago, Colin and Ewen.
