

# Water Filtered Through Sand Anthracite, to Remove Iron

Tuesday of this week, the \$200,000 iron removal plant went into operation and with it the anticipated end of the rusty water came in sight.

The plant engineered by Proctor and Redfern, and built by Armstrong Brothers, was started in December and enclosed

flushed this week and next to rid the system of any iron deposits. This may cause rusty water, during that time.

The swimming-pool like structure is a settling bed for the iron oxide. At lengthy intervals this will have to be cleaned.

Blue, yellow and white are the cheery colours dominating the inside of the building, colours not usually associated with a water works.

With the water tower in operation for the last few months the whole water works system is now automated.

Georgetown Fair on Sept. 22-23 this year will have a new midway for their centennial fair. Star Broadway Shows of Ottawa will replace the usual March midway, due to the earlier fair date, it was announced last week at a meeting of the board at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Spencer Wilson, Norval.

Advance prize lists have been out for some time for the Ladies section of the fair, and at the meeting further Centennial Specials were added, including a centennial quilt, prizes \$5, \$4 and \$3; rug \$4, \$2 and \$1; do-nuts, plain, \$2, \$1.50 and \$1; scones \$2, \$1.50 and \$1; Johnny cake \$2, \$1.50 and \$1.

Many angles of the fair were discussed at the meeting, and one of particular interest to cattlemen of the district will be the upward trend in prizes in all classes. Prize money offered is more than double previous years, and should auger well for a big cattle show in 1967. Plans were made to make more accommodation available for cattle.

The Quarter Horse Show, which proved to be so popular last year, will again form part of the fair, and a big line-up of hunters and jumpers is expected, as there are no breed shows on that date.

A report was given by members of the Centennial committee working in conjunction with the fair. Among other events they are considering a Friday night concert, Saturday parade to the park of bands, floats and school children, antique cars, winding up with a mammoth street dance.

It was also reported that the Centennial Caravan would be in Georgetown Park August 3, 4, 5.

A junior prize list has been placed in the school for all pupils, and it is hoped the younger set will get in the mood of the fair.
