# Boudreau Leads Giants To Opening Game Triumph

Georgetown Giants jumped on Milton starter Dave Asleton for four runs in the second inning and then coasted to a 7-3 victory in a Halton County League game here Wednesday.

Third baseman Tony Boudreau a product of the Milton Minor Baseball Association, led Georgetown's assault on three Red Sox pitchers with two singles and a double in four trips, allowing the Sox just seven well-turned in a fine performance.

Winning pitcher Bernie Dore spaced hits. Only batter he had any trouble with was first baseman Ron Phillips, who belted a double and a triple.

Manager Dick Clement of the Red Sox was forced to juggle his starting infield when slick-fielding third baseman Glen

Dance came up with a sore arm.

**BOTH CURRIES**  
Clement shifted shortstop Art Melanson to third, second baseman Bill Currie to short, inserted Red Currie at second and left Phillips at first.

With scheduled starter Ron Naylor missing, Clement divided his pitching chores among three pitchers, Asleton, the starter and loser, got relief help from John Hopkins and Mike Boughton.

Milton held the lead briefly in the second when Red Currie singled, went to second on a fielder's choice and scored on a double by Eddie McLeod.

The Giants jumped on Asleton for their four in the third

on a single by Dore, a double by Boudreau, a single by short stop Danny Arbie, and error by Bill Campbell's grounder, a walk to catcher Don Lindsay and a hit batsman.

**LONG TRIPLE**  
Milton's second run scored in the fifth when Phillips unloaded a standup triple to deep left centre and scored on a single by Butch Riddle batting for Red Currie.

The last three Georgetown runs scored in the sixth when Dore doubled, centrefielder George Doucette singled, and Boudreau singled. Boudreau went to second on the throw to the plate and scored the final run on two infield outs.

Clement wasn't discouraged

by the initial defeat. "We'd have beaten them with Naylor pitching," he contends.

### BASEBALL TIPS

## The Bunt: An Art That Can Break Up a Game

The ability to laydown a good bunt in a critical part of a ball game is a skill. Many ball games are lost due to a bad bunt or a player not knowing just how this play is done.

When hunting toward first, establish that angle in direction of first. It is best to bunt down the first base line to advance a man to third. Rarely is a runner forced at third when the pitcher fields the ball on the first base side.

Keep the angle of the bat level with ground, and bunt only strikes. In gripping the bat, the hands must be apart. The top hand should slide along the barrel to the trade mark. The bottom hand slides to player's comfort or remains stationary. Grip bat lightly. Assume your natural stance for hitting in the box, as you see the ball leaving the tips of the pitchers hands, move your rear foot parallel to the plate and shift the front foot back parallel to the rear foot almost in a hopping motion, bring your body around to face the pitcher.

PLAY PERCENTAGES: Left-handed first basemen usually charge hard, so drive them back by hitting the ball with hands apart. The pitch should be a fast ball with something on it; the swing should be down. A good sacrifice bunt is made when the player is not in motion. Do not run until you have completed the bunt. Sacrificing is literally giving yourself up, but remember the bunting angle. A sacrifice is a team success.

The body action is back, not forward. The bunt is made out in front, not behind the body. A slight break of the knees at impact will aid in deadening the roll of the ball. The top hand takes full control of placing the bat on the ball. Bend the knees on low strike pitches. Bunt the ball in the direction of first or third; never toward the pitcher.
