

Near-Perfect Score For Jaycee Bike Road-E-O Winner

Greg Nelissen, son of Mr. and Mrs. L. Nelissen, RR 1, Georgetown, scored 79 of a possible 80 points to emerge top rider from a bicycle Road-E-O at the Georgetown Park, Monday.

Greg was Senior Boys Champion Jim Hammer, son of Mr. and Mrs. August Hammer, 2, Bard Lane, was Junior Boys champion with a 70 point total. Pat Syme, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Syme, 167 Ray, lawn Cresce, was senior girls champion with 64 points, and Ann Milne, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. S.A. Milne, RR 1, Georgetown was junior girls champion with 72 points.

Three boys with high scores, Ricky Cunningham, RR 1, Norval; Peter Cloke, 2 Shelley St. and Dave Fishburn, of Norval, drew honourable mention for their high scores. They tied at 77.

Every child taking part was presented with a pamphlet on "How to Be An Expert Cyclist"

a list of mechanical defects if any, and the ten commandments for safe cycling.

More than a hundred youngsters participated in the Road-E-O according to Ron Sauer, Jaycee Youth Education Commission Chairman. The Jaycees sponsor the event annually.

Jaycees inspected all bikes entered for mechanical defects, and conducted riders through a test course. Group participation was encouraged through the local Guide and Scout organizations with 1st Georgetown Scouts winning a special cup. They had a group average of 69 points.

The average score of all Scouts participating was 65. Brownies 54, Cubs 52, and Guides 52.

Jaycees said they hoped more interest in the Road-E-O would be taken by parents in encouraging their children to enter in future. The aim is to create bicycle safety, handling skill.

Week's Activity For North Halton O.P.P.

There were 36 general occurrences recorded by the North Halton detachment of the O.P.P. during the period May 14 to 20 according to a statistical report issued this week.

The list includes:

1 break enter and theft of assorted items in Nassagaweya Township, a theft of tools and a theft of gasoline from a vehicle in Equeusing Twp., 3 complaints of assault were recorded in which 1 person was charged 1 L.C.A. investigation resulting in one person being charged under the Liquor Control Act. Two persons were charged under the Criminal Code — 1 for possession of stolen property and 1 for theft. There was one premise found insecure at night. Other occurrences were of a minor nature.

During the period, personnel of the detachment worked a total of 899 1/2 hours and patrolled

a total of 6,990 miles on area highways. As a result of patrol 19 traffic charges were preferred, 34 traffic violation warnings were issued, 38 vehicles were safety checked and 65 convictions registered.

There were 3 personal injury accidents resulting in 5 persons injured. 3 property damage accidents investigated and approximately \$1,590 in property damage recorded. Causes of accidents were inattentive driving, fail to yield right of way, too fast for road conditions, fire in the engine compartment, fail to share the road and driver lost control of vehicle — 3 traffic violation charges were laid as a result of these accidents.
