

Wandering Thru Southland Since Dec. 26, Kershaws Home

Mr. and Mrs. Albert Kershaw left Georgetown on Dec. 26th, to drive to Florida for the winter. Before they left Ontario they spent two days at Port Colborne, with Mrs. Kershaw's sister, Edith, who resides there with her husband, Mr. Ernie Alcott and their son, Robert. They left Port Colborne on December 29th, and arrived at Ocala, Florida, on New Year's eve.

Due to road and weather conditions, the journey down south was none too pleasant. They encountered snow in New York state, in Pennsylvania, more snow, freezing rain, sleet, slush, icy roads and fog, in Maryland, Virginia and North Carolina, more snow.

In South Carolina and Georgia, they drove through pouring rain, and finally sunshine, when they crossed the state line into Florida.

Having snow tires on their car helped a whole lot for them to combat their assortment of road and weather conditions.

On May 2nd they left Fort Pierce, homeward bound, before they said goodbye to the Sunshine State, and as they proceeded northward they visited Melbourne Beach, Cape Kennedy, and Daytona Beach.

At Homosassa on the west coast they visited Mr. and Mrs. Gordon Phillips who have a home there. Mr. Gordon Phillips built a tunnel kiln at Smith & Stone during 1943. The homeward journey was none too pleasant either. They had rain in South Carolina, freezing rain in Virginia, more rain in Pennsylvania, and snow and blizzard conditions in New York State.

They arrived back into Ontario on May 7th, and again spent 3 days with Mr. and Mrs. E. Alcott and son Robert at Port Colborne.
