GEORGETOWN PUBLIC LIBRARY CENTENNIAL PROJECT

Georgetown Library is offering prizes to the value of \$100 for stories and reminiscences of Georgetown and district. A first prize of \$50 will be awarded to the best entry of 2,000 words or more and other prizes will be awarded at the judges' discretion. Brief anecdotes will be eligible for \$5 prizes.

The intent of this competition is to secure material on the history of Georgetown which may otherwise be lost. All entries will become the property of the Library Board, and will be available for reference in the Library.

Publication of selected entries will be considered if this seems appropriate.

It is hoped that the competition will attract stories of early Georgetown based on family traditions, as well as first hand experiences of more recent date.

Entries will be judged by a panel of judges selected by the Library Board, and should be submitted to the Librarian not later than 1st October, 1967.

Provincial Employee Was Prominent Blood Donor

A Provincial Paper, Ltd., employee since 1939, George (Jiggs) Cooper, 57, died in Georgetown hospital on May 24.

A resident of Glen Williams since birth, he was the son of Mrs. Mary Marchmont Cooper and the late Lorne Cooper and attended Glen Williams Public School and Georgetown High School.

He was a member of Provincial Quarter Century Club and was treasurer of the Credit Union at the plant, and a member of the Liberal Party. He was a prominent supporter of the Red Cross blood clinics and had received a pin from the organization in recognition of twenty blood donations. He was a member of Glen Williams United Church.

He leaves his wife, Aileen Glass, whom he married in 1933 three children, Gary, Glen Williams, David of Georgetown and Glen of Brampton; his mother, Mrs. Mary Cooper of Milton; a sister Anne, Mrs. George Bentley of Milton; and four grandchildren, Correen, Barbara, Cheryl and Jamie.

Rev. Walter Ridley conducted the funeral service on Saturday, at the Harold C. McClure Funeral Home. Pallbearers were Stanley Tate, Toronto, Dave Williams, Brampton, Rupert Beaumont, Harold Wheeler, Robert Andrews and Ross Giles. Interment was in the family plot in Glen Williams Cemetery.

5 Innings, 24 Runs For PeeWee's Opener

Georgetown PeeWees of the Halton County PeeWee Baseball League scored 24 runs in a five inning game with Waterdown here Monday when they registered their first win of the new season by a 24 to 1 count.
