The front lawn of the Georgetown District Christian School, R.R. 1, Georgetown, was the scene of a flag raising and tree planting ceremony last Thursday.

A discussion on the importance of Canada's Centennial year in the classroom prior to the ceremony made the pupils realize that this was a special occasion to participate actively as a school in the centennial celebrations.

A new national flag and a centennial flag were raised by the honorary president of the Calvin Christian School Society Mr. P. Weststeyn, assisted by Mr. C. Houweling, chairman of the building committee, who had been in charge of the preparation and seeding of the front lawn. The national anthem was then sung by all present to conclude the flag raising ceremony.

Hire New Nurse, County Balks Nurses' Grey List

Halton County officials have taken the first step to forcibly break the "grey listing" imposed on the Halton county Health Unit by the 18,000 member strong Registered Nurses Association of Ontario.

Halton board of health accepted an application from a public health nurse sponsored by the health unit. The applicant attended university the past year to obtain her public health degree. The board has told her it will accept her as soon as she is available.

This move has come as a shock in the wake of confirmation from Queen's Park Tuesday afternoon that a top Labour conciliation officer has been appointed to mediate the dispute.

Halton county officials move it is not designed to make the work of the man from Queen's Park any easier an observer states.

The long drawn out dispute between the 23 public health nurses and the Halton county Health Unit has gone before the Labour Relations Board. Negotiations are expected to resume shortly with a top labor conciliation officer from Queen's Park acting as mediator.

The nurses have the full support of the 14,000 member strong Oakville and District Labour Council as well as the support of the R.N.A.O.

The nurses Friday met with the Labour Council in Oakville at which G.G. Heym, president of the council stated that he was not only bringing the support of the 14,000 affiliated members of the council but also the administration of the Ontario Labour Federation for the nurses fight.

Two nurses from the Peel county Public Health Unit also attended Friday's meeting as observers.

Mrs. Flora Hesson, president of the Halton County Public Health Nurses Association, stated that the labour conciliator would receive all possible assistance and good will from her association.

She said her association only wished to bring the dispute to a close after three years of stagnation and never ending conflict.

Express Hope

The nurses expressed hope and confidence that Halton County Council would now deal realistically and in good faith with the association and the labour conciliator appointed by the Ontario Department of Labour.

On May 1 the nurses applied for the labour conciliation officer. Their application was subsequently blocked by Halton county officials who filed an objection to it.

The objection was overruled by the Labour Department and Victor Scott, assistant director of conciliation services at the Ministry of Labour, said "one of our top officers in the conciliation field," had been assigned to negotiate the dispute."

Scott declined to name the officer but added that he has had many years of experience doing conciliation work and that he had a proven successful record in that field.

Heym told the nurses Friday, "We encourage you to maintain your good faith and while conciliation is in progress we will stand on the sideline in order to assure you of the fullest value of conciliation services."

"The ball is now in the corner of the Halton Council where it has been for some time. My colleagues in the labour movement in Halton and South Peel counties will closely observe what will happen in that corner of the ballfield."

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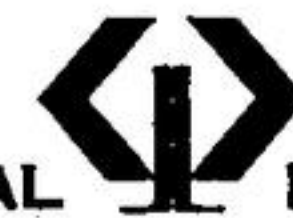
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
